This morning in county court be fore Judge Beeson was heard the case of the State of Nebraska vs. John 301.12 was quite a complicated one and cov ered the right of the railroads to dispose of a quantity of hay on their

TO AUTO OWNERS AND DEALERS

(1) When you are disposing of a car that has been registered under the present law, please observe Sec. 11 of the automobile law, which requires that you properly fill out the form on the back of your registration certificate, same must be signed by both parties, the party transfering shall sign as transferor, and the party buying, or to whom such car is sold or transferred shall sign as

You will then deliver such certificate to the county treasurer with the proper fee to re-register such car in his own name. A dealer should follow this same proceedure, the only difference being that there is no fee as per Sec. 13, charged against the dealer for a new dealers certificate.

(2) Wishing to change your li ense from a car which you have ransferred to another person, von nust present to the county treasurer a proper transfer, or a certificate properly transferred on the back thereof from the party you purchased your new car, with a fee of \$1.00, plus 56 cents for every 100 pounds, excest weight over your old car.

(3) As it is necessary for state records you must give the number of your plate, also the name and address of the party to whom you transferred your old one.

(4) You keep your original registration number or plate as it is not transferrable to another person, your Most of this furniture is new and license expires when you sell or trade all will be sold at special sale price your car, unless you renew same within 10 days according to Sec. 12 of present automobile laws.
