ARGUES AGAINST FEDERAL CONTROL

President of Business Association Believes It Would Be Forerunner of Worse Things.

New York, Oct. 14.—Return of the railroads to government operation would be but the forerunner of federal control of the fundamental sources of production such as steel, coal and copper, declared Alba B. Johnson, Philadelphia, president of the railway business association, in an address tonight at a banquet of the American manufacturers' export association.

"The national welfare requires us to stabilize the railway situation," said Mr. Johnson, "because we are in a conflict to preserve the principle of individual ownership of property and of individual opportunity. The railways are the first trench."

The speaker said his address could be summed up in "a golden text" follows: "Transportation is a business. It is the business of business men to put the transportation business on a business basis. Let us get business with a business program for transportation."

Alfred Reeves, general manager of the national automobile chamber of commerce, said that the greatest development in automobile sales must come in foreign countries, thus necessitating greater exports from the United States.

Mr. Reeves said that in this country there is one automobile for every fourteen inhabitants, whereas in the remainder of the world there is only one car for every 2,840 inhabitants. American automobile manufacturers, Mr. Reeves declared, favor allowing foreign-built cars to enter the United States on the same terms that American cars are allowed to enter other countries.

L. S. Rowe, newly appointed director general of the Pan-American union, told the exporters that capital must be more freely invested in Latin-America before American trade can hope to obtain a permanent foothold in those countries.

Otto H. Kahn, financier, speaking at the afternoon session, advocated taxation revision and recommended that congressional committees be authorized by the law to have associate or auxiliary members who could attend all hearings and make authoritative reports.

Attendance of senators and representatives at committee hearings was "necessarily sporadic" because of the press of other duties.

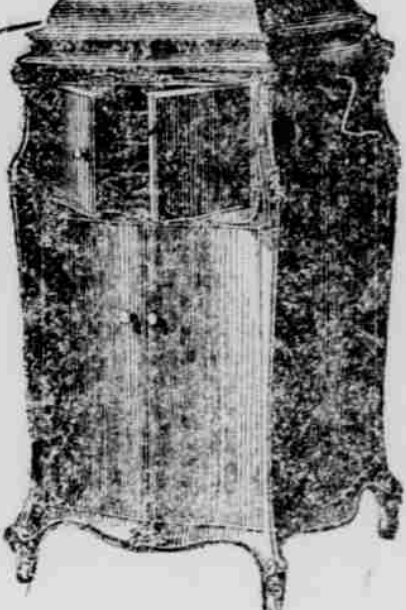

PART OF THE GOOD WORK BEING DONE

Salvation Army's Young Women's Boarding Home a Beneficiary of Army Funds Raised in Drive

Investigations by the various Salvation Army Advisory Board in 22 counties of the state, have proved conclusively to the Salvation Army that every county in the state of Nebraska annually sends several girls to the city of Omaha, "to make their fortunes." The confidential reports made by these Advisory Boards also disclose the fact that there is scarcely a county in Nebraska but that reports yearly the disappearance of at least one young woman. The officers of the women's division of the Salvation Army say that many girls are led into lives of shame through improper surroundings, and that they lead such lives with their parents totally innocent of the fact that anything is wrong. In order to provide girls who come to the city without friends, a clean home and proper surroundings, the Army contemplates the erection of a boarding home on the lot purchased from funds raised last year. Here a girl may secure individual room or room with another girl, and in rare cases with two others. Reception rooms are provided where the young women may entertain their friends with all the privileges and supervision of home. While the standards of these homes (the Salvation Army now operates 66 in the leading cities of the United States) is equal to that of any first class hotel, the fact that there are no high salaried officers to pay makes it possible for the Army to offer these rooms and three meals a day to the girls on an average of \$8 per week. Each girl is privileged to launder her own clothes in the modern laundry which will be installed in the basement. By inserting a penny in the slot machine a girl may iron with an electric iron for one hour. The home will be known as the Young Women's Boarding Home. It will be centrally located, so that the girls rooming there will have no car fare to pay and can return home at noon for a warm meal. The home, although erected in Omaha, is for the use of girls whose parents do not reside there. The sum of \$100,000 is being asked this year to help complete the building.
