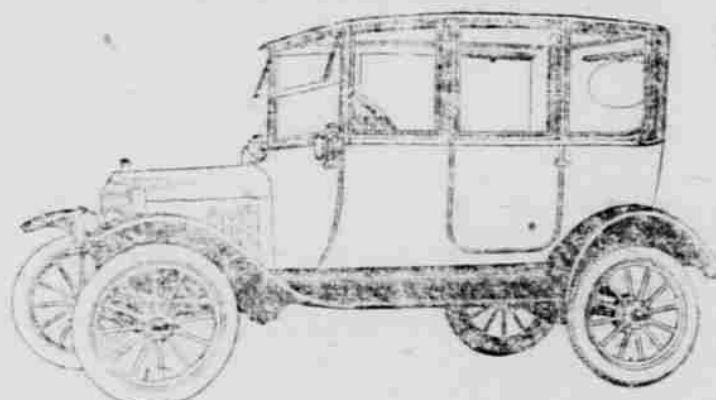

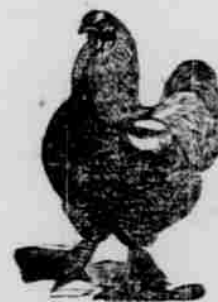

## TO TAKE POSITION IN AN OMAHA BANK

James H. Donnelly, For Many Years State Bank Examiner Resigns to Enter Banking Business.

The announcement is made at the state house at Lincoln of the resignation of James H. Donnelly, state bank examiner, who is to enter on his duties as cashier of one of the leading banks of Omaha. Mr. Donnelly has accepted the position of cashier of the State Bank of Omaha, the largest bank in the state operating under a state charter and one of the leading banking houses of the state.

In the resignation of Mr. Donnelly the state is losing a valuable official as his services as bank examiner have won him many tributes from those familiar with his work during the years he has served the state of Nebraska in this capacity. Mr. Donnelly was first appointed to this office by Governor Muesel in his first administration in 1912 and has served under both Governor Nevin and Governor McKelvie. His splendid ability and his retention in office a great advantage to the state.

During the early portion of the administration of Governor McKelvie, Mr. Donnelly was the head of the corporations department of the state and had charge of the investigations under the Vinesky law, resigning this position several months ago to resume his work as state bank examiner.

The Donnelly family have recently removed from Plattsmouth where they made their home for a long period of years and since locating in Omaha he has received many flattering offers to engage in the banking business and has decided to take up the position offered by the State Bank of Omaha. The many old friends here will be pleased to hear of his success and the institution with which he has become connected is to be congratulated in securing such a valuable and efficient gentleman to assist in the management of their affairs.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT IS NEARLY DONE FOR

All But Chief and Two Members Tender Their Resignation and Department is Without Membership

The Plattsmouth volunteer fire department today consists of three members, Chief Sandin and Frank Schurka, Jr. and Ed Weber, and the last two are serving only the short time that will elapse when their term of active service will expire and enable them to retire as honorary members.

The action that resulted in the practical dissolving of the department occurred last evening when the department held their regular meeting to elect officers and transact such other business as was necessary. The members of the department feel that their rights have been interfered with to a greater or less degree by the new city ordinance and the action of the city council in doing away with the offices of the foremen of the various hose carts that have long been a part of the organization of the department and for which the members received the salary of \$6.25 per quarter. The foremen were not in the best of humor at the taking away of the privilege of selecting the fire chief and vesting this right in the mayor of the city as was embodied in the ordinance adopted last winter and at that time several members dissolved their connection with the department. The selecting of delegates to the state convention which was one of the bones of contention in the ordinance was another of the many grievances that led to the tendering of the resignation of the members of the department. The fact that the fire department was not given the privilege of selecting the driver for the new fire truck that is to arrive in a few days served also to hasten the parting of the ways for the firemen.

As the matter now stands with the exception of the three members named above the city has no fire department and until the arrival of the fire truck there will be only the volunteer efforts of the citizens to carry on the work of the department. The members of the fire department who are employed in the shops have also had the additional difficulty of getting away from their work in case of fire as they are compelled to lose their time from the shops in case of being called out and which makes their service practically impossible.

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## DISTRICT COURT GRINDING

Yesterday afternoon Judge Hegley called the docket for the November term of the district court, and the different cases were assigned for trial and the preliminary work for the opening of the jury term arranged. The jury has been called for Tuesday, November 16th. The jury will have a number of very important cases to come before them including the divorce suits of Mrs. Edna Taylor, Elmer Taylor and Mary Brown vs. John Keukal, et al, as well as the matter of the estate of John Webber, deceased, and in the last case a number of noted specialists will be summoned to testify as to the ability of the deceased to make a will. This morning the time of the court was occupied in hearing the motions offered by various attorneys on the litigation that is pending on the docket.

## BIG GATHERING OF EAGLES LAST NIGHT

LOCAL AERIE WITH 78 MEMBERS AND BAND VISITED AERIE AT SOUTH OMAHA LAST NIGHT

Last evening one of the most successful meetings held by the F. O. E. in the state was enjoyed at South Omaha when the aerie of that city visited the representatives from a number of the neighboring towns. The largest representation at the meeting was from Plattsmouth, Nebraska City and Omaha, and the Plattsmouth and Nebraska City delegations were accompanied by bands which added to the interest and gave a demonstration of the fact that these two aerie were alive and on the job.

This city had seventy-eight members as well as the band in their delegation and the turn out was larger than in any other city outside of the south Omaha aerie and our neighboring city, Nebraska City was represented by a delegation of thirty-five members with their band and the two cities proceeded to put the Eagles on the map in South town during their stay there and their address was one of the best ever delivered on the subject of the Eagles as an order. Mr. Mann stressed the fact of the Americanization principle of the order and the splendid manner that the Eagles had responded to their country's call in time of need. The war in Germany was declared on April 6, 1917 and on April 17th the grand aerie had adopted a resolution creating a patriotic fund from which the nearest relative of the members falling in the war were to receive \$1,000 from the order as a remembrance of the sacrifice so nobly made by the brother Eagle. From this fund \$1,500,000 had been collected and already \$1,250,000 had been distributed to the relatives with a number of other claims outstanding. These claims had been paid in France, England, Bohemia, Greece, Belgium, Sweden and Denmark and spoke of the great standard of 100 per cent Americanism maintained by the order that had taught to the membership the love of country that had prompted a service even unto death. At the outbreak of the war 12,000 members of the Eagles had volunteered in the service of the army and navy and many other thousands came into the army in the draft so that the strength of the Eagles in the service at the signing of the armistice had been \$6,000. Mr. Mann in his remarks paid a glowing tribute to the Plattsmouth aerie, to which he has ascribed the awakening interest in the work of the Eagles in the state and the remarkable growth was something that the order could be well proud of and was a great achievement for the Plattsmouth aerie.

Worthy State President A. P. Morgan of Nebraska City also complimented Plattsmouth on its growth in membership and urged all those who could see that their aerie were represented at Plattsmouth at the state aerie in May of the coming year.

Worthy State Vice-President William Barclay, extended to the members of the order present an invitation to the big state gathering and promised that the city and the Plattsmouth aerie would see that the visitors were well received and entertained and he urged that every aerie be represented at the meeting.

The South Omaha aerie initiated twenty-three new members, the work being given by the drill team of that city and the Plattsmouth orchestra furnishing the incidental music for the work. At the conclusion of the speech making the members of the party were treated to an elegant feed which served to bring to the climax a most delightful evening.

The members from this city and Nebraska City returned on the midnight train.
