DEATH OF LOUIS WEBER AT CREIGHTON

Former Cass County Man Passes Away at Home in the Northern Part of the State.

The death of Louis Weber, at one time a resident of this county, occurred at his home near Creighton, Neb., on Wednesday, December 29th, following an eight day illness due to lowel trouble, and during which Mr. Weber had suffered a great deal.

Louis Weber was born in Hessen-Darmstadt, Germany, February 16, 1874 and at the age of fourteen years he joined the German Lutheran faith in his old home and continued active in the church work up to the time of his death. In the spring of 1890 he sailed from Germany for America to make his home in the United States. He came direct to Plattsmouth, arriving on June 2, 1890, and continued to reside here until 1899, when with his brothers, he removed to Knox county, Neb., and located on a farm where he has since resided. On June 2, 1916, he was united in marriage to Miss Rosa Thieroff, who with two brothers, John Weber of Plainview and Peter Weber, residing in Germany, as well as two sisters residing in that country, are left to mourn the death of this good man. The funeral services were held on January 1st from the German Lutheran church at Creighton, and were conducted by Rev. George Obermier, pastor of the church.
