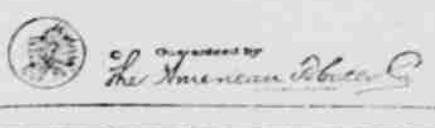

For a minor infraction of the school rules, which it is highly essential that all should obey, a number of seventh and eighth grade boys have been deprived of their recess privileges for a few days. The regulations, boys, it is easier in the long run and safer too.

The geometry class has been "scrapping" with some very original problems during the past week, which, when solved, will assist them to a better understanding of the principles of geometry.

The ninth grade students have been improving themselves in the problem of demonstrating the principles of salesmanship during the past week.

With the conclusion of the first semester period of the second semester, there is marked improvement in the work being done, especially among the grade pupils.

The Nehawka schools have participated in these contests before with good success and it is hoped they will be equally as efficient this time.

The bookkeeping class is struggling with trial balances this week, and find them not so easy to master, but by constant application they are found to come out all right in the end.

We have lost Barney and Goldie Smith from the Nehawka schools as they have moved to a farm in the northern part of the state and will attend the Crofton school.

A number of the members of the Home Economics class gave a reception and dinner at the Economics room in the basement of the school building on last Tuesday noon at which they were hostesses to their mothers, serving a most delightful meal as a demonstration of their acquired ability along culinary lines. Those who played the part of hostesses were Misses Grace Linville, Marie Correll, Clara Dwyer, Donna Doughty and Genevieve Stone. Later other members of the class will entertain their mothers at a like repast. The tables were decorated with cut flowers and artificial decorations and the meal was served in most approved style.

The agricultural class, during the past week has been busy with milk tests, which each member made on one of the cows on his own home. The test covered feeding, butter fat, milk production, etc., and was conducted over a period of five days. In all the test was applied to ten cows, which were fed on corn stalks and fodder, and after deduction for both labor and feed, it was found the cows returned an average profit of \$1.92 for the five day period. This is but an example of what can be done with cattle as a source of income, and under the proper farming methods, and the experiment proved most interesting to each and every member of the class.

CASE GOES TO THE JURY FOR DECISION

Suit of Annie Dollie Gaster vs. Woodmen of World is Argued by Attorneys This Morning.

From Saturday's Daily.

This afternoon the case of Annie Dollie Gaster vs. the Woodmen of the World, was given to the jury following the arguments of the attorneys in the triangle suit.

Payment of the insurance policy was contested by the defendant company on the grounds that the late Mr. Gaster had made false statements in his application and also that he had met death by suicide.

This stand was opposed by Attorney Matthew Gering for Mrs. Gaster, and Attorney George Tannison, of Omaha, who represented the mother of the deceased man, as intervenor, contesting with the widow for the amount of the policy. Both the plaintiff and intervenor contend the application was in proper form and that the deceased came to his death from natural causes.

The mother, who is intervening in the case, denied the validity of the marriage existing between Mr. and Mrs. Gaster, owing to the fact that George W. Wittstruck, the first husband of the plaintiff, was alive and two brothers of the late Mr. Gaster were on the stand today to testify that they had seen Wittstruck on a train in 1916, some seven years after he had disappeared from this city and from the knowledge of his wife and children who have failed to hear from him since that time.

Frank H. Gaines, counsel of the Woodmen of the World occupied but little time in his argument and the case was handed to the jury to determine upon the issues of the case as presented to them by the representatives of the three interested parties.

IMPROVEMENT OF THE STREETS LOOKS GOOD

General Sentiment is That Changes Proposed in Highway Near Masonic Home is Well Made.

The plans that have been formulated for the beautifying of the street near the Masonic Home as well as the closing of Sixteenth street for one block and the changing of the highway around by the way of the Missouri Pacific passenger station, seems to be meeting with general approval.

A representative of the Missouri Pacific was in the city today and expressed himself as well satisfied with the proposal to pave the portion of the street from the entrance to the Home west to the present paving on Seventeenth street. The company will also be willing to have their spur siding removed as far north as the grain elevator and which will permit a nice wide street at this point and one that will make a fitting entrance to the city.

The chamber of commerce committee that is to conduct the campaign for funds to purchase the north portion of the lots of Edward Fitzgerald, will start their canvass the coming week and it is hoped in the first two days to secure the amount needed and which will close the deal for the land and then the transfer of the property will be made at the Home association as the gift of the residents of the city and in turn the Home association will deed to the city the amount of land needed for the street.

This proposition does not involve

a great deal of money and is one of the most important steps that have been made toward beautifying the surroundings of the Masonic Home. Hereafter the travelers through the city on the trains have had a mere glimpse of the very handsome home buildings and the chief sight has been the foreground of sheds and buildings and banks of dirt and these will be wiped out if the present plans carry out as they seem assured of doing.
