HITCHCOCK FAVORS TRADE WITH RUSSIA

Nebraskans Urge Removal of Artificial Barriers in Way of Commerce.

Washington, D. C., March 25.—Senator Hitchcock believes in encouraging trade relations with Russia. He made his attitude clear today in a statement on the subject, showing that while it does not seem that the time is ripe for recognition by this country of the soviet government in Russia, it is, nevertheless, desirable to resume trade relations, and to permit Russian gold offered here in payment for American goods.

"I favor removing any artificial barriers which prevent trade with Russia," said Senator Hitchcock. "Russia, it would be a step in the direction of restoring normal relations in international affairs. Surrounding the situation in Russia there is still great mystery and so no one can say definitely just what the beneficial results would be of encouraging trade resumption."

Would Grow Steadily
"Probably Russia has little to sell to us, probably also she has not much with which to pay for anything that she might buy of us. I think, therefore, any immediate action of resuming business would not be largely beneficial, however, the current of business would grow steadily."

"One of the artificial barriers against selling goods to Russia is that we have declined to accept her gold at our mints. I doubt the wisdom of this action or the justification for it unless all the nations of the world unite in the policy. Obviously Great Britain has planned to accept, if she is not already accepting gold from Russia and so also undoubtedly are other countries that have resumed relations with her."

Soviets More Conservative
"The danger that once existed of political propaganda inspired and paid for by the Russian government has practically disappeared. I think it may be said that the Lenin-Trotsky government has abandoned the effort to convert the world and is modifying its own government into a much more conservative form than it started with."

"It is understood, however, that the establishment of trade relations with Russia does not involve diplomatic relations and does not involve the political recognition of the soviet government. That is not likely to come until that government has still further modified its attitude on political questions."

CITIZENS TRAINING CAMPS PROPOSED

Tentative Plans Announced by War Department—At Snelling and Camp Pike in This Dist.

Washington, March 24.—Tentative plans for conducting citizens' military training camps next summer were announced today by the war department in instructions issued to the nine corps area commanders. Preparations were ordered for training approximately 1,200 candidates in each corps area, allocations being announced for either one or two camps in each. The number of candidates to be recruited for each area was predicated on sufficient funds being made available in the next army appropriation bill.

Of the three grades of camps, the department has provided, denominated "red," "white" and "blue" and varying as to the amount of technical military training to be given, the first grade, it was said, will be emphasized in the program for the coming summer. It is planned to hold the "red" camps because they should appeal to young men between the ages of sixteen and nineteen, the department said, and afford an opportunity to demonstrate to parents the "physical, moral and mental development that results from military training."

Dates for opening the camps will be between July 15 and August 10, the department said and applications for entering should be addressed to the commander of the corps area in which the applicants live. Location of the camps in the nine areas are as follows:

- First, Camp Devens, Mass.
- Second, Camp Dix, N. J., or Plattsmouth, N. Y., or both.
- Third, Camp Mead, Maryland.
- Fourth, Camp Jackson, S. C.
- Fifth, Camp Knox, Kentucky, or Camp Sherman, Ohio, or both.
- Sixth, Camp Grant, Illinois, or Fort Sheridan, Illinois, or both.
- Seventh, Fort Snelling, Minnesota and Camp Pike, Arkansas.
- Eighth, Fort Logan, Colorado, and Camp Travis, Texas, or Camp Stanley, Texas.
- Ninth, the Presidio of San Francisco and Camp Lewis, Washington.

WANDA URBAYTIS IS ARRESTED IN CHICAGO

Chicago, Ill., March 25.—A young woman who gave her name as Wanda Urbaytis, was arrested here last night and is held as an accomplice in the mail robbery at Toledo, on February 17, in which more than \$1,000,000 in cash and securities were stolen from registered mail pouches. The loot has not been recovered.

The women gave her age as 25. She will be turned over to federal authorities for return to the Ohio city where an indictment for complicity in what postoffice officials declare to be one of the largest mail robberies in history have been voted against her. She had been sought in a nation wide hunt during the past six weeks, following the arrest of her brother, Joe, and a second man at Elkhart, Ind., a few days after the robbery. The girl admitted at the time by locking herself in a compartment of a train on which the trio were riding from Toledo. She is said to have carried a handbag supposed to have contained at least a portion of the loot.
