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## ASKS PASSAGE OF NEW BANKING LAW

Experiment Tried in Case of Blair  
Bank Prompts Executive to In-  
troduce a Bill in Senate.

Governor McKelvie sent a message to the senate Tuesday asking for the introduction of a new bill to require district judges to appoint the department of trade and commerce receiver of state banks which are ordered closed by that department. In the absence of a district judge any judge of the supreme court may make such appointment. The bill prepared by the governor gives the department authority to appoint one or more special employees as its assistant or assistants and to employ such clerical help as is needed to perform the duties of receiver. These expenses are to be fixed by the department and approved by the court are to be paid out of the assets of the failed bank. A district judge recently appointed the department receiver of a state bank. The present law does not prohibit such an appointment but the governor desires authority of law.

The governor said in his message to the senate:  
"This proposed legislation is the outgrowth of the experiences of the present administration in the handling of bank receiverships. Heretofore, these receiverships have been disposed of entirely by the court, and

yet it has been impossible to cause the people to understand that the state department is not responsible for the handling of these receiverships. Under this measure the authority of the department will be extended to a proper field of activity and the state will be given the opportunity to discharge a responsibility which properly belongs to the banking bureau of the department of trade and commerce.

"There is nothing new or revolutionary about this proposal. The same policy is observed by the federal government in handling receiverships for national banks, and in this state it is observed in the bureau of insurance. Indeed, the bill that I am handing to you herewith contains in it a verbatim provision taken from the insurance code, relative to the conduct of receiverships.

"Recently the court co-operated with the state to the extent of making the department of trade and commerce the receiver in the case of the insolvent bank at Blair, and the action has met with such general approval that I feel the people of the state would welcome an amendment to the state to dispose of all bank receiverships in this manner. I therefore, recommend this bill to you for earnest consideration and passage."

## LANGUAGE BILL ADVANCED BY THE HOUSE

GOES TO THIRD READING BY A  
TWO TO ONE VOTE—VIC-  
TORY FOR LEGION.

NUTZMAN VOTES AGAINST IT

Cass-Otoe Representative Offsets the  
Vote of Frans for Measure by  
Lining Up with "Nays."

The struggle over S. F. 160, the Reed-Norval language bill ended late Monday afternoon with advancement of the measure to third reading by a vote of 65 to 31 in the lower house. The announcement of the result does not tell the story of the session's most bitter skirmish. The only remaining question appears to be on the procuring of two additional votes to put the bill across on third reading with the emergency clause. The absentees were Messrs. Bethea, Dyball, Osterman and Stephenson. Friends of the bill expressed confidence that the strength will be forthcoming.

Members of the American legion not only with their votes but with their reasoning, did much toward putting the measure through. The claim was made by some that not a vote was gained by the stubborn resistance to the plating in the schools of Nebraska any language to compete with the English. Some members, however, expressed the belief that from six to ten votes were won.

But the determined manner in which men voted, gave indication of minds long set. Probably for the first time of the session during roll call on an important measure, not a member dodged the vote. Not a member passed when his name was called. Not a member changed his vote and not a member answered in the uncertain voice which so readily may be swung one way and then another. The answers to the call were strong, some of them carrying the ring of challenge.

### Resist Amendments.

Friends of the bill successfully resisted amendments offered by Representative Gifford and F. E. Anderson. Mr. Gifford's amendment would permit religious instruction in any foreign language on any day in which the regular day school is not in session. It was defeated 39 to 51. Mr. Anderson's amendment, covering practically the same ground, was voted down 31 to 46.

They were voted down on the theory that any opening may be a dangerous opening, that the bill is one to regulate education and not religion and that the provisions shall cover the school room, not for a part of the day but for all of the day. In a strong closing address, Representative Byrum answered those who suggested that the courts will hold the bill unconstitutional because of an interference with religious teaching. In the following:

"I defy you to find one word in this bill which says that you may not worship God in accordance with the dictates of your conscience. I do not see one venture to say that the courts will hold that a prayer meeting is a school? You can worship in any language on any day. A congregation of church people is not a school. This bill does not venture to say what shall or shall not be taught in the church. It reaches only the schools. It will not interfere with religious teaching any hour of the day or night. This will be the court's construction."

## EXPECT SENATE WILL MODIFY CENSOR BILL

Believe Measure Will Be Presented  
Without Arbitrary Board of  
Three Clause.

Lincoln, Neb., April 4.—Members of the legislature were generally predicting this morning that House bill No. 113, the moving picture censorship bill, will be materially changed when it comes out of the hands of senate committee to go on the floor of the senate Wednesday.

Most important among the changes which will be made, it is said, is the elimination of the arbitrary board of three motion picture censors. Two reasons are given for the elimination of this part of the bill. A number of the legal members of the legislature are of the opinion that it is unconstitutional as outlined in the bill. The amended constitution restricts the creation of new executive offices except upon appointment by the governor, and confirmation by the senate or by a joint session. The movie bill, these members say provides for the appointment of an executive board not by the governor, but by a committee made up of the governor, the attorney general and the superintendent of public instruction.

### Must File Cash Bond.

In the event that the members of the censor board might be considered employees and not executive officers, the bill would still be unconstitutional it is said, for the reason that the constitution provides that all employees must be appointed by the head of the department by which they are employed.

Many members of the house who voted for the censorship bill, declare that they see in the proposed amendment of Senator Beebe a better and more effective bill to control moving pictures. Beebe's amendments eliminate the provision for an arbitrary board of censors. They provide that every motion picture distributor must file application with the governor to lease or sell every picture that he handles and that he must place a cash bond of \$1,000 in the hands of the governor as security that the provisions of the law will be complied with. The bill then makes the same restrictions as the Byrum-Gifford bill as

to what pictures may be shown and provides that no immoral scenes may be depicted unless they are shown for the purpose of condemning crime or immorality.

It is generally predicted that the bill in this form will pass the senate tomorrow, and house members among the many who voted for the bill originally declare that they will vote to concur in the senate amendment.

### What Beebe Says of Bill.

"The bill in this form will get much better and quicker results than in its present form," Senator Beebe declared. "It puts the censorship authority, not in the hands of three people, but in the hands of every one of the 1,390,000 moving picture fans of the state, including mayors of cities, county attorneys, probation officers, child welfare workers—anybody interested in moving pictures. The assurance that he will forfeit \$1,000 if he shows an illegal picture, will be enough to make the movie producers and distributors careful about bringing in such pictures into the state. If they are not brought in they can not be shown."

### GIRL-WIFE HELD WITH HUSBAND FOR MURDER

New York, April 3.—Mrs. Carolina Verdesora, 17-year-old step-daughter of the dead woman and her husband, Luciano, 28, were arrested today charged with the murder of Mrs. Catherine Trotta, a widow of night of her body near a pond.

The body, richly clad, was wrapped in an expensive shawl and with a piece of rope tied about the neck. The woman had been missing a month.

Physicians said the woman had been strangled to death and had been dead only two days. Police declare relatives had quarreled over the distribution of her husband's estate, and that pieces of cord identical with that found around the neck were discovered in the Verdesora apartment.
