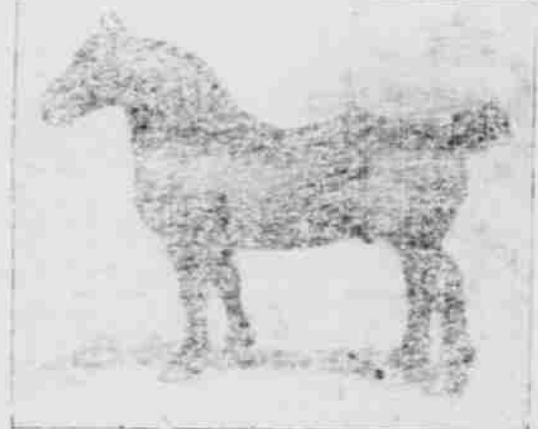

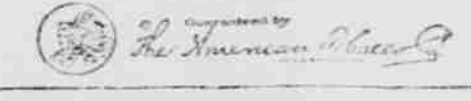

Denison, Neb., April 21—A terrific storm, a zephyr path a quarter of a mile wide, passed through the eastern part of Otoe county at 4:30 p. m. Wednesday, demolishing farm houses and buildings and injuring livestock.

Union, Neb., April 21—A tornado did thousands of dollars worth of damage to farm property in this part of Otoe county at 4:30 Wednesday afternoon. Mr. and Mrs. Otto Spatt and four children are destitute of farm home and other buildings on the place, along with their furniture and clothing. The farm was located three miles west and five miles south of Union. Two children are of school age and two are younger. The family were in a storm cellar a short distance from the home when the tornado struck. After the storm they took refuge at the home of neighbors.

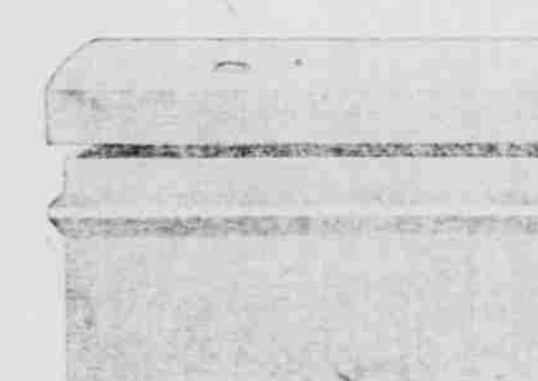
