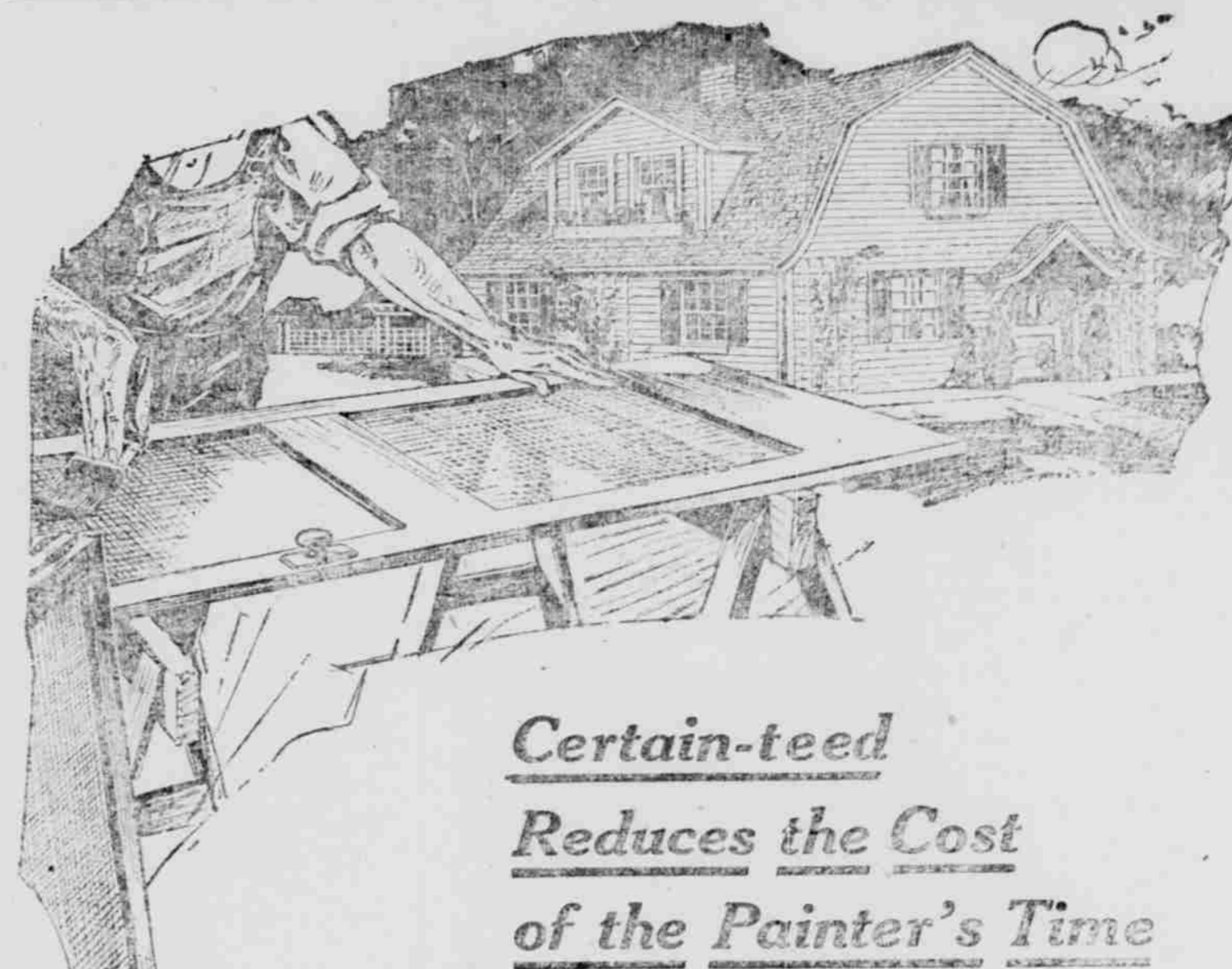

TO VISIT DEVASTATED SECTION OF EUROPE

M. Fanger, of Omaha, Expecting to Leave Soon for Poland to Rescue Schall Children.

M. Fanger, the Omaha merchant, and who has for the past several months been conducting a store in this city, expects in a very short time to start on the first steps of his journey back to the land of his nativity, Galicia, or that portion of it that is now a part of the Polish republic. The mission of Mr. Fanger is to locate the children of William Schall, his brother-in-law and to bring these little ones back to the father in the United States if possible.

The children have been endeavoring for several months to join the father in this country, but have found the task one of great difficulty as they have been unable to secure the necessary permission from the authorities that would allow them to leave and consequently they are still at the old home. The children were for a short time at Warsaw, the capital city of Poland, in an effort to get their papers signed, but Mr. Fanger has been informed that they have since returned home.

The journey will be one of sadness to Mr. Fanger, as during the great war his aged mother, who resided near Lemberg, was a victim of the privations of war, and passed away of starvation as it was impossible to get money or supplies from this country to her relief and the first information received after the close of the war told of her passing away.

Mr. Schall, the father of the children, who are now in Poland, has made every effort to get the little ones back with him, but as he is not a citizen he has found this a matter of great difficulty and therefore the mission has been undertaken by Mr. Fanger himself.

OIL LEASES AUCTION AT DOUGLAS JUNE 15

Casper, Wyo., April 21.—The sale at public auction of oil leases on 8,489 acres in the Salt Creek oil field, twice postponed by the Interior department, and representing the first sale authorized under the new oil leasing law, will be held June 15, it was announced today from the Douglas land office, where the sale will be conducted.
