D. A. R. SESSION IS CONCLUDED.

Washington, April 23rd.—The Daughters of the American Revolution adjourned their thirtieth national congress today after installing officers elected yesterday. While proceedings of the final session were of a perfunctory nature, announcements of candidacy for president general in the 1923 election and action of the resolutions committee in pigeonholing a resolution introduced early in the week calling upon members of the society to aid in a strict enforcement of the Volstead prohibition act, proved interesting topics.

The prohibition amendment called attention to the fact that the D. A. R. was pledged to support the constitution, and as the eighteenth amendment was a part of the constitution, the organization should give it strong support. When the

committee in submitting its final report failed to refer in any way to the resolution there was considerable comment from supporters of the dry move.

Mrs. Anthony Wayne Cook, of Pennsylvania and Mrs. William M. Reynolds of North Carolina were formally announced as candidates for president general and it was reported that Mrs. William Cummings Story will shortly announce her candidacy for the leadership.

MANY BILLS AWAIT SIGNATURE OF GOV.

THIRTY-EIGHT HOUSE ROLES AND SENATE FILES ARE IN M'KELVIE'S HANDS

While the legislature is debating and discussing what to do with the few remaining bills sent to conference committee, there are thirty-eight in the hands of the governor awaiting action. They are:

- H. R. 593, increasing salaries of Lancaster county attorney's deputies.
- H. R. 597, appropriating \$15,500 for Everett Soiders, orthopedic hospital patient.
- H. R. 599, fixing tuition fee for non-resident high school pupils.
- H. R. 64, defining lawful automobile lenses.
- H. R. 85, relating to feeble minded institution.
- H. R. 98, providing for the reclamation of neglected blue-sky laws.
- H. R. 102, state aid for weak public schools.
- H. R. 138, alien land ownership bill.
- H. R. 225, relating to reciprocal demurrage claims.
- H. R. 241, creating lien on property left with jeweler for repair.
- H. R. 253, changing designation of non-partisan ballot to non-political.
- H. R. 262, sundry amendments to election law.
- H. R. 340, cuts out police magistrates in city of Omaha.
- H. R. 241, provides for presiding judge of Omaha municipal courts.
- H. R. 342, eliminates justices of peace for Omaha, after 1923.
- H. R. 402, fixing salaries of members of board of control at \$4,000.
- H. R. 408, new blue-sky law.
- H. R. 417, appropriating \$2,000,000 for relief of ex-service men.
- H. R. 424, appropriating \$10,000 for fish hatchery in Lincoln or Garden county.
- H. R. 453, appropriating \$4,500 for family of Juvenile Probation Officer Sexton, killed in Omaha.
- H. R. 457, requiring board of public works to notify county clerks of estimates for bridge construction.
- H. R. 497, providing for distribution of supreme court reports.
- H. R. 505, code governing sales of merchandise.
- H. R. 527, cutting salaries of Lancaster county drainage trustees to \$200 a year.
- H. R. 550, relating to duties and liabilities of hotel keepers.
- H. R. 559, making corporations responsible for statements of stock salesmen.
- H. R. 565, prohibiting false statements in advertising securities.
- H. R. 566, new procedure for the bringing of suits against corporations.
- S. F. 52, defining habitual criminal and providing ten years' punishment.
- S. F. 89, public morals bill.
- S. F. 148, public warehouse run by co-operative associations.
- S. F. 180, providing for formation of public improvement districts outside of cities.
- S. F. 189, creating a state park board.
- S. F. 197, providing for inspection and regulation of bee industry.
- S. F. 270, amendments to the state pure food and drug act.
- S. F. 319, authorizing use of condemnation power by cities of second class and villages to get power of light plant sites outside.
- S. F. 323, relating to cancellation of lease on state land set apart for park purposes in Daves county.
- S. F. 351, permitting courts to name department of trade and commerce men as receivers of banks.

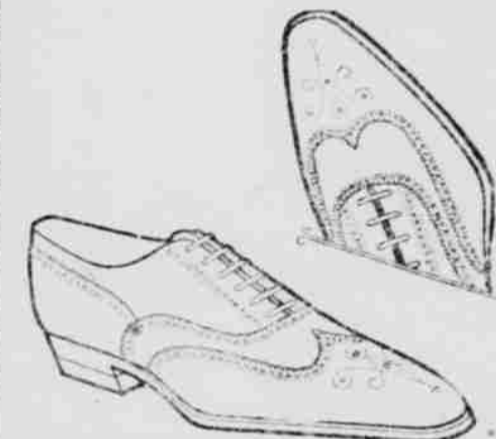

travesty, a group of stockholders, having asked for the appointment of a receiver and requested that the Omaha Trust company be named.

The appointment of a receiver came about when a group of stockholders attempted to have an Omaha Trust company appointed receiver. William Ritchie, counsel for the Skinners, insisted that this is but a continuance of the old tactics to hamper the operation of the company by persons with sinister motives.

"The attorneys bringing this litigation are the same who have caused most of the trouble we have had and this constant harassing has made it

very difficult for the company to be financed," said Mr. Ritchie, in regard to the action of the stockholders.

"In fact, they have deliberately attempted to prevent its being so financed. The suit now pending is practically the same as the suit which the supreme court dismissed last summer over the protest of these same attorneys. The company has tangible assets exceeding all indebtedness by at least 250 per cent and if this kind of agitation can be stopped, the stockholders will eventually secure a fair return on their investment."
