

### RAILROAD'S HARD LUCK TALE IS TOLD

Piling up a Deficit of \$4.182 Per Mile on Nebraska Lines.

eral government to railroads have not luck story told Thursday by J. M. Seibert, real estate and tax commisoner of that road. He told his doleful tale to the Nebraska board of taxion and equalization, or a part of The members of the board pres were State Tax Commissioner W Osborne, State Treasurer Dan B Propesy and Secretary of State Darius

M. Amsberry. The road's representatives reported big deficit and asked for a reducon of \$377.277 in the assessed valuation of the company's property in Nebraska. The board will listen to ther railroads before acting on valnes in the different lines. Mr. Seibert asked the Nebraska board to be is lenient as possible.

There has been some talk at the state house of a prospective increase in the assessed valuation of the Misenri Pacific. According to Mr. Seiert this would be a crime. His company has 347.88 miles of road in braska, assessed last year at \$2. 71.545, or an average of \$6,819 a These figures are based on the pany paid \$145,732 taxes in Nebraska ast year, or \$46.26 a mile. The company reports \$3,389.072 gross earnings for 1920. It gives its operating expenses as \$4,844,203, a defiit of \$1,445,131, or a loss of \$4,-182.86 per mile.

Attorney E. R. Giffin of Denver. appearing for the North Platte railread company, was not able to present a valuation of his company's property, but he reported net earn ings of \$17,000. The company owns 31.12 miles of spur track in Scottsbluff and Sioux counties built for the purpose of hauling beets to the facory of the Great Western Sugar company. The lines are leased and perated by the Burlington road. The ight of way was taxed focally last ear and will be taxed for the first ime by the state board this year.

The state board will hear the Rock Island railroad Friday and the Burington, Union Pacific and Northwestern roads next Monday.

The Omaha & Southern road which has six miles of track was assessed last year on a basis of \$3,000. It now nforms the board that its deficit last ear was \$8,431 and that its total leficit is \$45,000. It recently asked permission from the state railway commission to increase its rates.
