REPORT FRANCE SEEKS ANOTHER LOAN IN U. S.
New York, May 16.—France, it was authoritatively learned today, is negotiating for another loan in this country. The amount, its terms and general details have yet to be settled.
Confirmation of the report that French treasury bills outstanding in this country now totaled less than \$10,000,000 as against almost \$75,000,000 in October, 1920, was given today by D. W. Morrow of J. P. Morgan & Co., who recently returned from abroad. According to Mr. Morrow, France paid, within the last half year, obligations in the United States amounting to more than \$125,000,000. This included her share of the Anglo-French loan.

The information has been received here of a serious automobile accident on last Sunday at Pekin, Ill., and in which Mr. and Mrs. John Haynie of this city and their daughter, Mrs. Fox, were the victims.

From word received from Pekin, it seems that Mr. and Mrs. Fox were driving in their car and were showing Mr. and Mrs. Haynie over the city and vicinity, with Mr. Fox driving the automobile and in some way their car ran into a ditch, throwing the occupants out and badly injuring them. Mrs. Haynie had two ribs broken as well as a severe cut on one of the lower limbs while Mr. Haynie had his collar bone broken as well as the shoulder dislocated, and a severe cut on the right eye. Mrs. Fox, the daughter, was also badly bruised and suffered severe injuries. The three members of the party were taken to the hospital, where they have since been and while their injuries are not thought to be dangerous they will require some time to heal and it is thought that Mr. and Mrs. Haynie will be compelled to remain in the hospital for another week at least. Mr. Fox was not seriously hurt, although he was bruised severely, but was able to write to the friends here of the accident.

BIG BUSINESS DEAL CLOSED AT MURRAY

W. H. Puls Hardware Store is Sold to George Meyers of Weeping Water Consideration, \$51,000.

From Wednesday's Daily.
A very large business deal was closed at Murray last evening through the instrumentality of T. J. Brendel of that place and Dr. H. A. Crozier of Weeping Water, by which the W. H. Puls hardware store in Murray was sold to George Meyers of Weeping Water, and the amount involved in the deal is \$51,000.
Mr. Meyers, who is the owner of the Meyers garage in his home city, gives in the deal 320 acres of land situated two miles east of Weeping Water to Mr. Puls and received in turn the fine and up-to-date hardware stock of Mr. Puls.

This is a very fine business transaction for all parties concerned and is the direct result of the able handling of Mr. Brendel, who has had the negotiations in charge for some time and is one of the biggest deals of its kind that has occurred in Murray.
While the business deal has been closed Mr. Meyers or Mr. Puls have neither given intimation of their future plans.

With high rents and inadequate accommodations everybody realizes the need for homes and strenuous efforts have been made to start a building boom, but it is slow starting, notwithstanding the unquestioned need for houses.
What is the reason? Two mainly, lack of money and high costs. In spite of the great increase in cash held by the banks and the reduction of loans, it is still difficult to borrow money for any but the most necessary purposes.
Building costs have come down a great deal, but they are still higher than they were before the war. These two things check building operations.

PREPARING TO ASK FOR DISSOLUTION

School Board of Murdock Consolidated District Visit County Superintendent to Arrange for Dissolution

Yesterday afternoon the members of the consolidated school district of which Murdock is a part, were called at the office of County Superintendent Miss Alpha Petersen to arrange the means by which they might procure the dissolution of the district. Since the creation of the district the voters have decided against the issuance of bonds for the construction of a school building and this has made the machinery of the district inoperative as there is no central school established and accordingly the members of the school board have decided to ask that the district be dissolved.
Under the law the districts where there have been no bonds voted may cause the dissolution of the district by securing the petition of twenty-five per cent of the voters of the district for the holding of another election and on the presentation of this petition the county superintendent will issue the call for the election.
The Murdock board had the decision of County Attorney A. G. Cole in the matter and will take the steps necessary under the law to give them relief in the matter.

DECLINE IN RETAIL PRICES

Washington, May 17.—A decline of 2.7 per cent in retail prices for the average family for April as compared with March was reported today by the labor department. On prices of forty-three articles from fifty-one cities, thirty-one showed a drop, ten an increase and two no change. For the year to April 15 a combined drop of 28 per cent was reported.
Eggs decreased 18 per cent, flour and potatoes, 8 per cent; prunes, 7 per cent; nut margarine, lard and rice, 6 per cent; butter, 5 per cent; cabbage increased 21 per cent; bacon 6 per cent; pork chops, 5 per cent.
Birmingham, Butte, Memphis, Mobile and Salt Lake City showed the greatest decrease at 5 per cent. Portland, Ore., prices decreased 4 per cent. In Los Angeles, San Francisco and Seattle, 3 per cent. In Denver and Omaha the decrease was 2 per cent.
