County Board of Equalization to Meet. The County Board of Equalization will meet for the purpose of equalizing the assessment of Cass county for the year 1921 in the Commissioners' Chamber at the Court House in Plattsmouth, Nebraska, commencing on Tuesday, June 14th, 1921, at 9 o'clock a. m., and continuing in session from day to day until NOON on Friday, June 17th, 1921.

First conviction under the new law. Deputy State Sheriff O. D. Hedge reported to the state law enforcement bureau Thursday that A. D. Liampke of the year 1921 in violation of the new state prohibition law, to the illegal possession of intoxicating liquor, when arraigned in the district court at Franklin, and Judge Blackledge imposed the minimum penalty on the defendant, a fine of \$500 and a sentence of thirty days in the county jail.

State Sheriff Hyers says that this is the first conviction under the new state prohibition law, and he looks for a considerable decrease in the number of violations, because of the severity of the measure. Mr. Hyers pointed out that the new prohibition law provides upon conviction for a penalty of not more than a fine of \$500 and thirty days in jail to a maximum fine of \$5,000 and a maximum sentence in jail of one year. Under the old law the trial judge had the option of assisting a fine or a jail sentence or both, but under the new law a full sentence must be imposed if the person is convicted or pleads guilty to a fracture of the state prohibition measure. The jail sentence goes no matter how heavy the fine imposed.
