## DEPARTMENT HEADS LEAVE PERU NORMAL

State Teachers' College Will Lose Several Important Instructors to Institutions in Other States

Peru, Neb., June 17.—Peru will lose its dean of women, and head of the department of history, Marie Cook Ellis; the head of the biology department, Prof. C. Jean; the head of the home economics department, Mrs. F. C. Jean; the head of the expression department, Miss Iva M. Dunn, and its president, E. L. Rouse, whose resignation was announced some time ago.

Dean Marie Cook Ellis of the Peru state teachers' college, has been tendered a similar position in the state teachers' college at Mankato, Minn. Miss Ellis came to the Peru normal as a critic in the training school. Later she became associate professor in history and has for many years been dean of the department. Six years ago she was appointed dean of women.

No faculty members has served the school for as many years as Miss Ellis and no one has been so closely associated with the recent life of the school. Her responsible position as dean of women has brought her into close personal relationship with every girl in the school. By her work in the history and sociology departments she had made herself a host of friends among the earlier students. Probably no other teacher is so widely and favorably known as Miss Ellis.

Prof. C. Jean, head of the biology department of the Peru state teachers' college, has recently been offered a similar position in the Colorado state teachers' college at Greeley, Col., with an increase of 25 per cent in salary. He has tendered his resignation to take effect August 1.

Prof. Jean came to Peru in 1911 as an associate professor and has gradually been promoted until he is now one of the major heads. Mr. Jean has been a most popular instructor. He has always taken a keen interest in class organization, Y. M. C. A. and faculty activities. It is largely through his efforts that the faculty dinner club was organized during the present year. He holds both his bachelor's and his master's degree from the University of Nebraska.

Mrs. F. C. Jean, who has been head of the home economics department for the last three years, severes her connection with the school at the same time.  
Mrs. Jean, as Miss Mable Hancock, came here as an assistant in the home economics department in 1912. When she took charge of the department three years ago, there was but one student left in the department. This year the department has had the largest enrollment of any department in the school.

Mrs. Jean received here bachelor of arts degree from the University of Nebraska in 1918.
