WILLIAM M. BARCLAY IS NAMED AS WORTHY PRESIDENT OF STATE F. O. E.

PLATTSMOUTH SECURES TWO OF THE STATE OFFICERS, WILLIAM H. MASON BEING NAMED AS THE STATE INNER GUARD.

From Tuesday's Daily.
The second day's session of the state aerie of the Nebraska Fraternal Order of Eagles convened this morning at the Eagles hall and reports of the various committees were at once taken up and acted upon.
On motion the state aerie voted the sum of \$200 for the expenses of the Nebraska delegate to the grand aerie of the order which will meet at Newark, New Jersey, August 8th to 15th. The representative from Nebraska will be Hon. A. P. Moran of Nebraska City, retiring state worthy president and who will make an able figure in the great national gathering.
The committee on lapsed members reported in favor of action by the local aeries in cases where their members are more than one month in arrears as to dues and suggested that local secretaries notify the parties in question as well as the local aeries appoint committees to visit individually the members who might be back in dues.

Resolution on Ireland
The committee on resolutions through Chairman G. F. Bushorner reported the following resolution reflecting the sentiment of the state aeries as to the small nations of the earth in their struggles for liberty and particularly Ireland:
EXTEND SYMPATHY
Whereas, our government entered the World War that liberty, justice and equality might be preserved as the guiding influence in the lives of nations and men; and that the small nations might, to the fullest extent, apply and enjoy these principles in the development of their lives and destiny;
Therefore, we extend the sympathy and encouragement of this great Fraternity to all the distinct nationalities of the world, however small, in their efforts for freedom and self-determination;
And especially do we sympathize with and encourage Ireland in her efforts to free herself from the yoke of tyranny under which she has suffered for more than seven hundred years.

G. F. BUSHORNER, JERRY CARRIG, A. G. SHUBERT.
Past Grand Trustee Barrett of Omaha, spoke very eloquently in favor of the resolution and recounted the acts of bravery and sacrifice made by those of the Irish race in the cause of the freedom of the United States and the preservation of its self government.
Judge A. B. Duncan of St. Joseph Mo., past grand worthy president, also spoke in favor of the resolution and pleaded for an agreement of the nations as to the determination of peoples and the preservation of the liberties of the small nations. A League of Nations, association or concert of the nations was urged by the speaker to bring about the realization of the liberty of all the peoples of the earth, and to the effect that they were kept intact even at any cost.
The resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote and placed on record as signifying the position of the Nebraska aerie of the F. O. E.

Visit Masonic Home
The convention adjourned at 10:45 to take an auto ride to the Nebraska Masonic Home, where a service was entertained for a short time and looked over the great institution that the Masonic fraternity has erected to shelter the aged and helpless of their order.

Election of Officers
On the resuming of the morning session at 11:30 the matter of the nomination of the state officers of the Eagles was taken up. State Worthy President A. P. Moran turned the chair over to Past Worthy President Ernest Hahn, of Fremont, and taking the floor, in a few and well chosen remarks placed in nomination for the office of state worthy president, William M. Barclay, of Plattsmouth. The nomination of Mr. Barclay was made with a pleasing tribute by Mr. Moran to his services rendered the Eagles of the state and was seconded by a number of the delegates and Mr. Barclay was declared the unanimous choice of the convention for the office of state worthy president.
For the office of state vice president the first contest of the convention was developed. Jerry Carrig, of Columbus, placed in nomination for the office L. L. Moschler, of South Omaha. A. H. Brewer of Nebraska City, placed in nomination C. E. Fowler, worthy president of the aerie of that city and E. B. Abbott, of Beatrice, placed in nomination the name of G. A. Axline, of Grand Island. There being a contest for this office, it was laid over for the afternoon session.

W. O. W. INSURGENTS LOSE SUIT TO ENJOIN
Judge Wade Declines to Restrain Frasser From Presiding at Meeting — May File Another Suit
Effects of Woodmen of the World "insurgents" to prevent W. A. Frasser, sovereign commander, from functioning at the national convention of the order to be held in New York, July 5, failed yesterday when Federal Judge Martin J. Wade refused them an injunction.
"It just means that our delegates will have a chance to go down to New York at their own expense, and get kicked out," was the comment of Charles Enitt, one of the "insurgent" leaders for Nebraska.
"Members of the organization must remember that the majority rules," said Judge Wade, in giving his decision.
"The granting of an injunction is not granted, the complainants feel they are done an irreparable wrong. It does not appear that the property rights of the organization are in jeopardy and the charge that the complainants were to be deprived of attending in attending the convention would not justify this court to decide in their favor."
Attorneys for the complainants indicated they might start another suit in the New York federal court. Judge Wade, however, stated that his decision is final, so far as that particular phase of the convention is concerned.
