### SEEK TO ENJOIN ROAD APPROPRIATION

#### MONEY FOR FORT CROOK PAYING HELD UP BY NON-PARTISAN ACTION.

J. D. Ream, Alfred Johnson, D. S. Sheets, John O. Schmidt and Andrew Dahlsten, constituting the executive board of the Nebraska nonpartisan league, have brought suit in district court at Lincoln on behalf of themselves and all other taxpayers in the state similarly situated, the object of which is to annul the action of the state legislature in appropriating the sum of \$75,000 to aid in the paving of the highway between Fort Crook and Omaha.

The plaintiffs ask that the auditor be enjoined from drawing, issuing or approving any warrant or order upon the state treasurer for the appropriation of any part thereof and that the action of the legislature in making such appropriation was unconstitutional, and therefore void.

It is alleged by the plaintiffs that the legislature had no authority to make the appropriation which is attacked, as it is for a local purpose and the money is to be expended in a particular locality for the direct benefit of such particular locality, with only incidental, or remote or no benefit to the state at large; that the appropriation is to be expended neither for the benefit of the people of the state as a whole nor in pursuance of a duty incumbent upon the state as such.

Furthermore, it is alleged the appropriation is unconstitutional for the reason that the fundamental law of the state provides that the legislature shall not pass local or special laws for laying out, opening, altering and working roads or highways. It also provides that in all cases where a general law can be made applicable no special law shall be enacted.

The further charge is made that the appropriation is unconstitutional for the reason that it and the provisions concerning it are "not clearly expressed in the title" of the act, which was the general appropriation bill for the state government for the biennium. It is declared that this appropriation was not "for the state government" and it is not, therefore, covered by the title.

Plaintiffs allege that if a warrant is issued in pursuance of the appropriation and the money is drawn from the state treasury, it will necessarily increase their taxes as well as those of all other taxpayers in the state, thereby injuriously depriving them of their money, and leaving them without an adequate remedy at law.

The appropriation referred to in the petition was originally \$125,000, the amount having been inserted by the finance committee of the state senate. Later a contest occurred in the senate over the allowance of this and also an item of \$40,000 for a gymnasium for the state industrial school for boys at Kearney and the appropriation for a gymnasium for the state university, the latter to be partly built by private subscriptions. As a result of a compromise the appropriation for paving the Fort Crook road in Sarpy county was reduced to \$75,000.

### VOTE DOWN THE SIX HOUR DAY

Proposition Receives Little Support when Brought Before the American Federation.

Denver, Col., June 14.—A proposed campaign to bring about the six-hour day with eight hours' pay at the present time received little support in the convention of the American Federation of Labor here today.

Resolutions favoring shortening the work day to six hours with eight hours' pay were voted down after a short debate.

Backers of the measure declared they believed shortening of hours of work would solve the unemployment question.

The federation pledged its support to any of the affiliated organizations which may desire to obtain the shorter work day. It endorsed the fight of printers for a forty-four hour week.

A resolution presented by the Seattle labor council advocating not only a six-hour work day but elimination of all overtime was down voted.

A. C. Hay of the railway clerks and C. F. Graw of the machinists advocated passage of another resolution placing the federation on record for a six hour day with eight hours' pay.

The report of the committee on a shorter work day declared that wanted to curtail the hours of labor they did not believe the business conditions were right now to push the six hour day with eight hours' pay. The report was adopted.

The convention adopted the resolution calling for the federation officials to ask President Harding to Hammond shooting and determine who was responsible for furnishing the guards with "government guns and government trucks."
