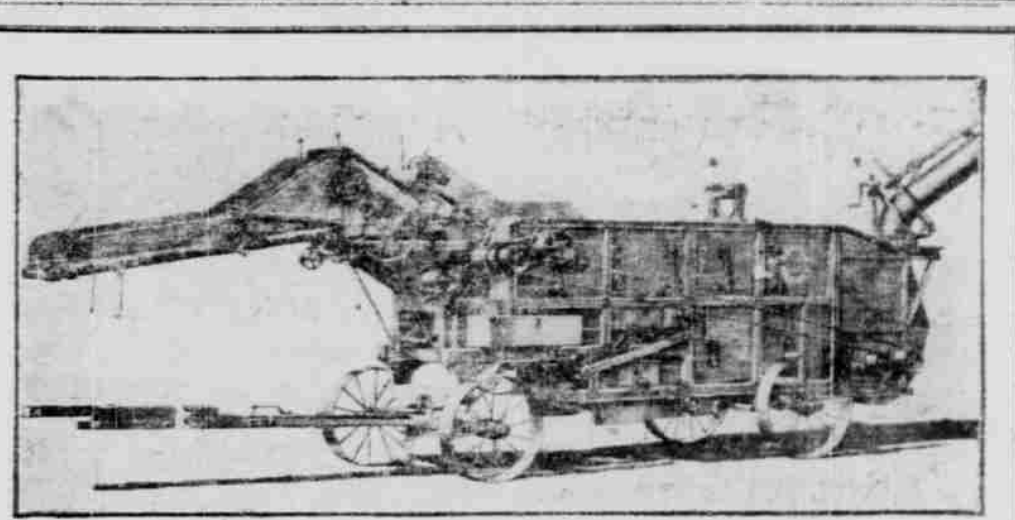

It seems that Mr. Hamilton with two young men companions were returning home from Union and when near the Gaben home the car got away from the control of the driver and headed for a telephone pole which fortunately it missed but tore through a wire fence and made a number of turnovers before it was checked. No one was injured but the car is decidedly the worse for the experience.

Another of the Sunday wrecks was on the road west of Union where the Velle car of Daniel Reynolds of Union and the Ford Sedan of John H. Hallstrom of this city came together and the meeting was not unlike that of Greek meeting Greek and both cars suffered more or less damage. The Ford was driven by James Mauzy while Mr. Reynolds himself was at the wheel of his car. The road at the point of the accident was very dusty and it was impossible for the two drivers to avoid the collision as they were too close together when the discovery was made to avoid the crash. The car of Mr. Hallstrom fortunately escaped with only one tire being torn off.

Another accident occurred on the M. P. crossing between Union and Nebraska City where the Franks accident occurred last week and this time it was a party of tourists who drove on the crossing as the train suddenly swept down on them and stripped one side of the Dodge roadster in which the party was riding. Two ladies who were in the car were badly injured and taken on into Nebraska City for treatment.
