OLD RESIDENT HAS SERIOUS ACCIDENT

George W. Shrader Well Known Over the County Breaks Collar Bone and Shoulder Blade

The many friends of George W. Shrader, one of the old and well known residents of Cass county will regret very much to learn of the serious accident sustained by Mr. Shrader on Sunday last. Since his recent illness Mr. Shrader has been making his home with his son, H. H. Shrader and family near Murray and has of late been feeling so much better that he has been up and around a part of the time. On Sunday he ventured out on the porch of the house and fell from the porch to the ground a short distance, fracturing the collar bone and the shoulder blade. Mr. Shrader has been partially paralyzed for some time and at times this has caused him a great deal of difficulty in getting around and failure of the proper use of his affected side was one of the causes of his sustaining the serious fall.

The advanced age of the patient and his already feeble condition has caused considerable suffering to him and his family and close friends have been greatly worried over his condition.

That he may improve is the sincere wish of the host of friends over the county as Mr. Shrader is one of

the last of the old residents of this portion of Cass county and has for many years been one of the leaders in the life of the community.

CANADA KINDLY TO SOLDIERS

Ottawa, Ont., July 26.—If Canadian soldier-farmers were to pool their holdings they would have one giant farm of 5,000,000 acres, dotted with grain fields, cattle, hogs, patches of fruit trees, silos and many sturdy houses and farm buildings. Population of this one big figurative farm, according to a report on the work of the soldier settlement board would be more than 126,000, estimating an average family of five to each settler.

The actual number of ex-servicemen who have been placed on land through government aid is 25,443. Short courses have been held in idle months and all phases of mixed farming, scientific dairying and purebred cattle raising given intensive study, according to the report. Experts have been sent into many districts to provide continuous supervision.

As a result of the aid, financial and educational, a very high percentage of the men are becoming successful farmers, the report says.

FEEL CERTAIN JAPAN WILL BE IN FULL ACCORD

UNOFFICIAL ASSURANCE CAUSES DISARMAMENT MOVE TO TAKE ON NEW LIFE

BUSY NOW WITH THE DETAILS

Date of Meeting Becomes an Important Matter—U. S. Would Like to Have It in November.

Washington, July 26.—With full Japanese participation in the disarmament conference regarded as finally assured, American officials in charge of the conference plans are beginning to give earnest consideration to the date of meeting as the next step in the diplomatic preliminaries. Such exchanges as have taken place regarding the meeting date are understood to have been informal, pending a definite statement of Japanese consent to give early into the discussions. From now on, however, the subject will be given greater prominence with the United States leaning strongly toward late fall as the most advantageous time.

Official word of Japan's willingness to discuss far eastern questions had not reached the state department tonight, but officials showed much gratification over the news dispatches saying such a decision had been reached by the Japanese cabinet.

Want Preliminaries Cleared

It has been the desire here to clear away these preliminaries quickly, though confidence has been apparent that Tokyo would interpose no obstacle to the unreserved discussion desired.

Once Japan definitely has prepared to come into the conference here without self-imposed restrictions and reservations, it is the belief here that the participating powers can reach an agreement without difficulty regarding the program of the session.

The date of meeting, however, is a consideration of some importance which will have to be decided before formal invitations go out. American officials have emphasized that they desire to get the delegates together as soon as practicable, so they have no intention of attempting to operate what day shall be selected. They have suggested armistice day, November 11.

Whether that time will be acceptable generally to the other powers is unknown here, but news reports from abroad have indicated Great Britain in particular might be delaying the meeting until spring. Much data must be prepared by each nation for use during the consultations here, large staffs must be organized and many physical arrangements made in addition to reaching an agreement on the program.

Has Decided to Accept

Tokyo, July 26.—The Japanese cabinet has decided to accept participation in the proposed conference on far eastern problems, the press was informed today. It is understood the Japanese answer will be forwarded to Washington in the near future.

Official circles tonight were disposed to forecast definite action by the Japanese cabinet in acceptance of President Harding's suggestion for a far eastern conference. Apparently the talks between Ambassador Shidehara and Secretary of State Hughes in Washington have gone far toward clarifying the situation. According to Japan's understanding of the American viewpoint, as given out here, America's idea is to make the basis of the conference a broad discussion of policies and principles, although each participant would have the right to introduce specific subjects. If they were germane to the principle under discussion and if the powers generally in the past were affected. The idea is said to prevail that questions affecting two powers should be left, wherever possible, to the powers concerned.

For the past twelve years Mrs. Craig has been suffering from the effects of a paralytic stroke and this has gradually grown worse until death came to relieve her of her suffering. At the time of death the deceased was fifty years of age and leaves to mourn her loss the husband as well as the foster father, Ernest Richter of Murray, Mr. Richter, Frank Marasek and wife and Wesley Hill and wife all of near Murray were in Sioux City Sunday to attend the funeral services of their beloved friend and long time associate.

ELMWOOD DOCTOR SUED FOR ACCIDENT

Randolph Johnson of Lincoln Files Suit Against Dr. John Deering As Result of Accident

An action has been filed in the county court here as the result of an automobile accident that occurred on July 14th at Lincoln and in which the plaintiff, Randolph Johnson, the defendant, Dr. Deering and a man named Byrne were involved.

The petition of the plaintiff states that on the date above mentioned the plaintiff was driving his Ford car north on 33rd street in Lincoln at the same time that the man named Byrne was driving west on O street and the defendant driving east on the same street. It is alleged that the defendant, Deering was coming at a high rate of speed and struck the car of Byrne throwing it across the intersection and striking the car of Johnson with the result that the car of Mr. Johnson's was badly damaged.

The plaintiff asks that judgement in the sum of \$500 be given against the defendant. The defendant has not as yet filed his answer to the allegations of the plaintiff.
