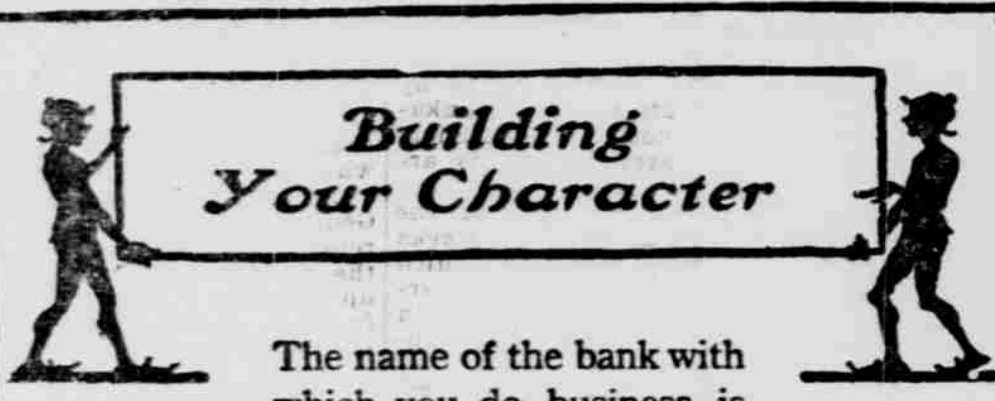

CONFERENCE FOR A TAX REDUCTION

Harding, Mellon and G. O. P. House Leaders Would Cut Expenses 520 Million This Year

Washington, D. C., Aug. 9.—Reduction of approximately \$600,000,000 in taxes and \$520,000,000 in government expenditures this fiscal year were agreed upon late today at a conference between President Harding, Secretary Mellon, and republican leaders of the house of representatives, including members of the ways and means committee.

Specific tax reductions on which it was announced agreement was had included:

Repeat of the excess profits tax, retroactive to last January, \$450,000,000.

Repeat of one-half of the transportation tax, effective next January 1, \$130,000,000.

Repeat of the higher income surtaxes, retroactive to last January 1, \$90,000,000.

Repeat of the so-called nuisance and clothing luxury taxes, \$50,000,000.

As an offset against this cut of \$720,000,000 it was agreed to increase the income tax on corporations by probably 2 1/2 per cent instead of 5 per cent as heretofore proposed, effective as of last January 1, to yield an additional \$125,000,000.

Decision was had, it was said, to abandon all new taxes suggested to the house committee last week by Secretary Mellon, including a license on automobiles, a bank check stamp and an increase of 1 per cent in the first-class postage rate.

Republicans of the ways and means committee are to meet tomorrow to draft a new revenue bill on the basis of the revisions agreed upon.

Under the agreement reached at the White House conference, government expenditures this year would be reduced from the previous estimated \$900,000,000 and the income from internal taxes would be cut from \$3,570,000,000 to \$3,075,000,000.

Cuts in expenditures included \$50,000,000 war department, \$100,000,000 navy department, \$1,000,000,000 shipping board, \$25,000,000 agricultural department, \$25,000,000 miscellaneous and \$50,000,000 in the estimated payments of \$545,000,000 to the railroads.

SENATE FILE 266 IS HELD INVALID

Lincoln, Aug. 6.—Senate file 266, passed by the recent legislature, is held by the attorney general to be invalid because of the misplacement on an amendment in the engrossed bill which was adopted by the state senate. The bill provides that treasurers of the various cities must deposit city funds in any bank qualifying as a depository. The bill requires such banks must provide a bond for the funds.

In the bill's progress through the legislature, an amendment was adopted exempting state banks, which are protected by the bank guarantee fund, from the bond provision. The amendment failed to get into the engrossed bill as signed by the governor.

KU KLUX KLAN LAWFUL BODY

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 7.—Sections of the constitution of the Ku Klux Klan were made public here tonight in a statement by W. J. Simmons, imperial wizard, sworn to before a notary public to show, he said, the purpose of the organization. The statement declared the "klan" does not "encourage or foster lawlessness, racial prejudice or religious intolerance," and went on to quote parts of the constitution, which declared its object were to protect the weak, "protect and defend the constitution of the United States," and "to aid and assist in the execution of all constitutional laws." Colonel Simmons' statement explained that the "Klan" is not designed to act in the capacity of a law enforcement or a moral corrective agency except to assist the regular officers of the law.
