SENATE FILE 266 IS HELD INVALID

Lincoln, Aug. 6 .- Senate file 266 pressed by the recent legislature, held by the attorney general to be invalid because of the misplacemen on an amendment in the engrossed as and discounts. \$187.728.95 bill which was adopted by the state 2,700,00 senate. The bill provides that treas urers of the various citles must deposit city funds in any bank qualifying as a depository. The bill requires such banks must provide a bond for the funds.

In the bill's progress through the legislature, an amendment was adopted exempting state banks, which are projected by the bank guarantee fund, from the bond provision. The \$277.150.04 amendment failed to get into the engrossed bill as signed by the gover

KU KLUX KLAN LAWFUL BODY

Atlant, Ga., Aug.7 .- Sections of

the constitution of the Ku Klux Klan were made public here tonight in a statement by W. J. Bimmons, imper ial wizard, sworn to before a notary public to show, he said, the purpose of the organization. The statement declared the "klan" does not "en courage or foster lawlessness, racia and true copy of the report made to prejudice of religious intolerance, and went on to quote parts of the constitution, which declared its object were to protect the weak, "protect and defend the constitution of the United States," and "to aid and assist in the execution of all constitutional laws." Colonel Simmons statement explained that the 'klan' is not designed to act in the capac ity of a law enforcement or a moral corrective agency except to assist the regular officers of the law."
