CHECKMAKER GETS INTO HANDS OF LAW

Man Giving Name of J. E. Welsh is Taken in Custody By Sheriff Quinton Last Night

From Friday's Daily. Last evening Sheriff C. D. Quinton was notified that a check drawn on the Farmers' and Merchants' bank of Ashland for the sum of \$12 and signed by a man giving the name of J. E. Welsh had been cashed at the Burlington station and was found to be worthless. The check was made by the man representing himself as J. E. Welsh and given to George Squires, operator at the station, the man representing that he was a telegraph operator and Mr. Squires in a fraternal spirit gave him the money trusting that the check was good but later found out that it was not. On being notified of the matter Sheriff Quinton started a search for the man and visiting the Missouri Pacific depot about 11:30 discovered a man answering the description of the man wanted, and on his being identified he was placed under arrest. At the time of his arrest he was engaged in telegraphing to Omaha for transportation over the M. P. to the south part of the state where he had been expecting to work and had asked for the transportation under the name of O'Brien. The man was brought in to the city and placed in the county jail to await further action on his case.
