HOOVER IS IN FAVOR OF EARLIER CENSUS

Suggests that One be Held in 1925 or Thereabouts Because of Dissatisfaction With Last.

Washington, Dec. 12 .- Because of "considerable dissatisfatcion" with the result of the count in the census taken last January, the house census committee is considering legislation providing for another enumeration of the population of the United States in 1925 or some other year prior to the next decepnial census. Washington, Dec. 12 .- Energetic pursuit and punishment of the more than 100,000 men who evaded the draft during the world war is urgently recommended by Major General Harris, adjutant general of the army, in his report made public today by the secretary of war. To bring those guilty to trial, he recommends that congress appropriate \$250,600 to pay rewards of \$50 for each deerter delivered to the military au-
