QUIETUS PUT ON M'KELVIE'S GASOLINE TAX

DEFEATED IN HOUSE BY VOTE OF 67 TO 31—ONLY TWO ABSENT AT ROLL CALL

The quietus was put on the governor's pet measure, the gasoline tax bill in the house shortly before noon Tuesday, when that body indefinitely postponed it by a vote of 67 to 31. There were two absentees, Gifford of Pawnee, against the tax, and Robertson of Douglas, who has not been in attendance at the session.

Nine of the supporters of the bill came from Douglas and two from Lancaster. Only Foster and Smith of Douglas were opposed. In Lancaster county Summerlad and Moseley voted for the bill, while Jeary, Mellor, Anderson and Green were against it. The governor's two appointees, Carroll and Qande, also voted aye. So did one non-partisan leaguer.

One disgruntled supporter, half in earnest, declared the opposition was made up of democrats, non-partisan leaguers and renegade republicans. Mr. Byrum said this merely showed that the democrats and leaguers were at last in good company.

The vote was preceded by a two-hour debate, in which Dysart, Jeary and Byrum starred. The forces lined up as follows:

JEWS OF STATE TO HOLD BIG MEETING IN OMAHA

Omaha, Feb. 1. (Special to the Journal)—The greatest gathering of Jews in the history of Nebraska will take place Sunday, February 5, when Jews from every section of the state will gather in Omaha to attend the conference for the relief of suffering Jews in war stricken countries of Europe. Judge Harry Fisher of the superior court of Illinois, and Charles Ruben, prominent manufacturer of Chicago, both leading Jews of America, will come to Omaha for the conference. Mr. Ruben is chairman of Zone No. 7, of the drive in which Omaha is located. The morning session will be held at the Jewish community center, Lyric. The chief meeting will be at night at the Brandies theatre, this meeting will be addressed by Judge Fisher, who recently made a tour of the war-stricken countries. Judge Fisher after witnessing the burial of more than fifteen children who had suffered horrible deaths from starvation pledged himself to aid the suffering. He hurriedly returned to this country and reported what he saw and advocated a nationwide appeal. He is an orator of note and has made several lecture tours. Mr. Ruben will also talk on a general line of the relief work. An invitation is extended to all Jews all over the state.

COLLUSION IS CHARGED IN PICK-FORD DIVORCE

Nevada Attorney General Asks Decree of Divorce be Set Aside On These Grounds.

Carson City, Jan. 30.—Oral arguments on a motion by Attorney General Leonard B. Fowler to have the divorce decree of Mary Pickford

from Owen E. Moore dissolved as illegal were made here today before the state supreme court by Fowler and by Miss Pickford's attorney, Gavin McNab of San Francisco.

Briefs have been submitted by both sides and a decision by the court is the next final step in the case.

Fowler attacked the divorce which was granted by Judge Frank Langman in the district court at Minden March 2, 1920, "in the interest of the state of Nevada," on the ground that Moore and Miss Pickford were guilty of fraud and collusion and that Judge Langman had no jurisdiction since the parties were bona fide residents of Los Angeles. He said the

courts of many states had held the state to be a third party in divorce cases.

McNab replied that the attorney general could not have appeared in the divorce trial on the side of either plaintiff or defendant nor as an independent intervenor, and that the district court's judgement was irrevocably final, since neither party to the divorce had ever appealed.

The court took the case under advisement, at the end of the argument. It has three months in which to make a decision, unless the case is resubmitted before that time.
