**CASS CO. FARM BUREAU NOTES**

**Corn Variety Test**

Corn was selected from the farms of Charles Cook, Plattsmouth; Andrew Dietrich, Louisville; J. R. C. Gregory, Cedar Creek; Charles Spohn and Harrison Livingston, Weeping Water, this week. The samples will be grown on the test plot by Paul Gerard, of Weeping Water.

**To Grow Soy Beans**

John Kuffenberger, Plattsmouth, W. B. Banning, Union, will grow soy beans for seed. The Ito Sand and Akasaban are the varieties chosen.

**Moving Pictures of County**

The Department of Agriculture will send men to this county this week to take moving pictures of the soil work done by the Farm Bureau. The soil dam at Chas. Meyers farm, of Weeping Water, and soil terraces of W. B. Banning, of Union, will be taken.

**Short Cuts in Sewing**

Twenty women met at the home of Mrs. George Hennings, Eight Mile Grove precinct. The demonstration on how to use sewing machine attachments was given. Many women said they never knew how to use the attachments and were surprised to see how many things could be done with them.

**Health and Nutrition Meetings**

Through the efforts of the Cass County Farm Bureau, Miss Florence Atwood, from the extension service was in Cass county April 18 and 19. The nutrition slides were shown at Greenwood, Elmwood and Nehawka. A fine attendance was noted at each place. Miss Atwood also gave a very interesting talk on malnutrition. She discussed the five causes of malnutrition, which are (1) physical defects; (2) lack of home control; (3) faulty food habits; (4) over fatigue, and (5) faulty health habits. All the women seemed very much interested and after the meeting met Miss Atwood and asked many questions about the work.

Next month Miss Atwood will be in this county the 9th and 10th. We will weigh and measure the children, as this is one way of ascertaining whether or not a child is up to standard. The health and nutrition work is one of the phases we expect to carry on all over the county.

**Soap Demonstration**

About sixteen women met at the home of Miss Rosie Gerard and a soap demonstration was given. Every one was interested and all the women told of their favorite recipe. Each one took the recipe used in the demonstration, and decided to go home and try it out. Any one interested in a soap demonstration write the Farm Bureau office at Weeping Water.
