VALENTINO MARRIAGE IS VOID

Movie Actor Has Made Himself Liable to Criminal Process by Marrying Too Soon.

Los Angeles, May 15.—The marriage of Rudolph Valentino, screen actor and Miss Winifred Hudnut, motion picture art director, which was solemnized at Mexicali, Mex., last Saturday is void in California and the bridegroom has made himself liable to criminal process, according to judges of the supreme court here. This condition is due to the fact that Valentino obtained an interlocutory decree of divorce from Jean Ackers, his first wife on January 10, 1922, and that decree will not become final until next January.

Valentino is still married to Miss Ackers and therefore cannot legally contract another marriage in California or anywhere else. Whether Valentino would be disciplined by the courts was not stated.

Judge Thomas O. Toland, who granted the Valentino decree declined to discuss the case today. Judge J. W. Summerfield, who is also engaged in hearing divorce cases, consented however, to explain the law. Judge Summerfield said that the entry of an interlocutory decree of divorce was nothing more than an order of the court that, nothing interfering, the parties would be entitled to a divorce after a year had elapsed. If they attempted their marriage within that year, he said, the result was bigamy.

Mexicali, Mex., May 15.—The marriage of Rudolph Valentino, screen actor to Winifred Hudnut took place Saturday afternoon in Mexicali, across the border from here with civil Judge Sandoval officiating. Valentino was reported to have told friends that he and the bride would leave immediately for New York to stay there "until technicalities are cleared up" and then return to California.


