BUSINESS TONE GROWS STRONGER

Strong Undercurrent in Direction of Industrial Recovery Throughout the United States.

Washington, Aug. 9.—Despite the coal and rail strikes, there is a strong undercurrent throughout the country in the direction of industrial recovery the department of labor announced today in an analysis of business conditions for the month ending July 31. An optimistic opinion prevails, the statement added, that with the settlement of the two major controversies the country will experience a rapid advance in industrial prosperity.

Evidence to support this opinion, the department said, was found in decided increases of employment in ten of fourteen basic industries. The iron and steel industry in some sections has suffered thru inadequate fuel supply, it was said, the employment registered material increases.

Decreases of employment in liquor and beverage plants and tobacco industry were said to have been negligible.

The survey indicated that the railroad repair shops of the country reported the heaviest decreases in the labor employment. In many sections of the country, building operations were said to be reflected in the employment increases in the lumber industry. The building boom continues unabated, it was asserted.

Forty-four cities out of sixty-five covered by the industrial analysis, reported employment increases for the month.
