OPENING DAY OF OLD SETTLERS' RE-UNION A SUCCESS

Large Number Present From Cass and Otoe Counties to Renew Acquaintances of Years.

From Saturday's Daily.

The opening day of the Old Settlers' reunion at Union yesterday, was one of the best in recent years and a great many were present to enjoy the program and to meet each other in the renewal of old times. The ranks of the old pioneers who thirty-four years ago promoted the first reunion, have been very much depleted but each year the ranks are filled from the younger generations who are now becoming the old timers of the county.

There is no single portion of the county that has more of the real old time residents of Cass county than does Union and there are still many living in that vicinity who came to Nebraska in the late sixties and the early part of the seventies and a scattering group of the residents who were here in the days before the Civil War. To these old pioneers the Old Settlers' reunion is certainly a rare treat in every way.

At the opening day of the reunion the program consisted of addresses by Mrs. Irene C. Buell, city attorney of Ashland, and one of the few ladies in the state to be members of the bar, and Attorney W. G. Kieck of Plattsmouth was also on the program for an address that he carried out in his usual effective manner. The dramatic club of Union presented "Our County Cousin," which was very much enjoyed by the large and enthusiastic audience.

In the sports program of the day, Union defeated Nebraska at baseball by the score of 11 to 8, and it was enjoyed by a large and enthusiastic audience at the ball park.

BRAVELY SAID

A veteran and able republican editor, M. A. Brown of the Kearney Hub, writing of the crisis in which Nebraska finds itself, says in the Lincoln Journal:

These are strong words, yet no stronger than the situation warrants. They are brave words, coming as they do from a man who has spent a lifetime in unselfish and devoted service to the republican party.

Mr. Brown concludes his article thus:

"The determination of the issue, for the immediate present, must be met by the coming state conventions. If the issue is not determined properly the people have the power to override it at the polls. Again, beyond that, the last word for or against will be the legislature to be reckoned with next winter. My own duty is clear, viz., to carry my protest against autocratic super-government to the very last tribunal where a man and a citizen can be heard."
