The newspaper business seems to be entering a new period. There is a kind of public interest in the technique of news gathering, editing and publishing that is different. Perhaps it is one more indication of the progress of democracy through the ancient hierarchies or feudal gradations.

Once upon a time the doings of kings and princes were not to be questioned by the common herd. Too much wasn't allowed to get about as to the plans or methods.

Then there was a good deal of mystery down through the ages attached to the religious function. When you had to scare people into being good by prophesying eclipses or dropping a bunch of burning leaves into a natural gas well, it didn't do to have too many people inquire into processes.

Nowadays, thanks to the vigilance and efficiency of the press, quite as much as to the growth of the democratic idea, everybody knows all about what King George has for lunch, and everything every religious organization does gets published somewhere or other, and every American knows how wevery government ought to be run, even if it isn't, and every college student knows what every one of the faculty is paid.

Curiously, the last stronghold of mystery was the newspaper. Perhaps because everybody in newspapers was so busy getting in and getting out the facts and stories about everybody else and everybody else's business, and took for granted the facts and poetry of his own, the public never heard much about newspapers from the inside. Reporters were often regarded as disagreeable or terrifying persons, which could make or destroy a business or reputation with a whiff of words. And so it goes.
