STATE URGES CAREFUL SELECTION OF SEED CORN

Reports Show that Farmers Adopt Methods Urged by U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Altho corn is probably sufficiently matured in most parts of the state to be out of the danger of frost, still seed corn selection in the field is well worth while for other reasons, just as in the old saying that "no two leaves are exactly alike," so it is with ears of corn and corn plants. If seed corn is selected in the crib there is no way of knowing what sort of a stalk the ear was produced on. In field selection one can pick an ear for its height and angle on the stalk as well as selecting a strong, sturdy stalk which is not too large and leafy for the secton in which it is to be grown. Plenty of good adapted seed, Your Support Solicited safely stored where it will properly dry and be protected from rodents is a good start for next year's corn crop. If the best results are expected by storing potatoes only potatoes of good quality should be stored. Potatoes will not improve in storage but are more liable to go down in quality. Many storage troubles are the result of poor field conditions, Potatoes should be left in the field a on by the strike, the business life of few hours after digging to permit them to dry. Immature potatoes will have to be handled and watched care-

with little real money to meet their Potatoes may be stored in open bins in a cool cellar or buried in the ground. If stored in a cellar they should not be piled more than a foot deep. When stored in layers deeper than this or in sacks, there is more hesitate to do so for fear of being danger of loss from decay.

Potatoes may be buried in the ground over winter, A shallow hole about 6 to 12 inches deep should be dug and lined with about 2 inches of straw. The potatoes should be placed in the hole and covered with straw and 4 or 5 inches of soil. Ventilation should be provided in the same manner as for storing other root crops. As the weather gets colder, place another layer of straw on the mound and add sufficient soil to of the law, which of course would prevent the tubers from freezing.
