MRS. F. D. OWEN AGAIN CHOSEN TO HEAD THE D. OF H.

Elect Officers and Pass Insurance Clause at Final Convention Session Last Night.

From Friday's Daily.

Mrs. Florence D. Owen of York, Neb., was re-elected grand chief of honor, or state president, of the grand lodge of Degree of Honor of Nebraska last night at the closing session of the biennial convention held this week in Omaha.

Other officers elected were: grand chief of ceremonies, Mrs. Maude King, Carroll, Neb.; grand recorder, Miss Rose Herrick, Lincoln, Neb.; (re-elected) grand usher, Mrs. Hansine Birk, Grand Island; grand in-door watch, Mrs. Fannie Wanzer, Hastings; grand finance committee, short term, Mrs. Adelia Harding, Hebron; long term, Mrs. Jennie Hicks, Omaha; and representative for superior lodge, Mrs. Lena Harre, Norfolk; Dr. Adda Wiley Halston, South Omaha, and Mrs. Florence D. Owen, York.

Mrs. Emma Thorpe of Omaha was elected grand treasurer by three votes over Mrs. Edna Silver at Sutton, Neb.

The seventy-year settlement clause enabling a member to draw her insurance benefit at the age of seventy years, was passed during the afternoon session. The delegates also adopted a resolution making the national fraternal rates compulsory in all the state lodges. Formerly the lodges might adopt the adequate rates of the national rates of their own option, but of the 275 lodges in the state all but thirty-three had adopted the national rates.

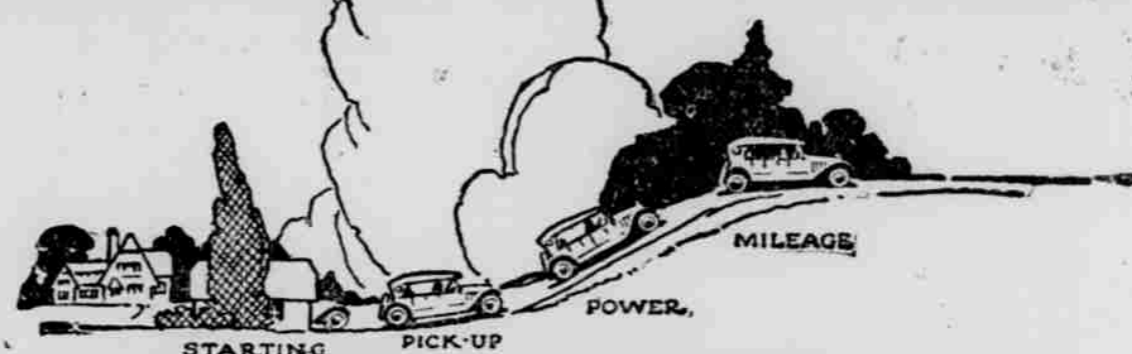
