BISHOP SHAYLER WILL OBSERVE ANNIVERSARY SOON

Nebraska Diocese Head Was Ordained Twenty-Five Years Ago—To Celebrate All Day.

Bishop Ernest Vincent Shayler, D. D., head of the Nebraska diocese of the Episcopal church, will celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination as a priest, Friday, October 27.

He will hold a private celebration in the chapel at the Episcopal residence in the early morning and public services at 11 a. m. at Trinity cathedral. The Episcopal church women of the city will arrange for a luncheon to be served in the parish house following the 11 o'clock service. The Rev. Thomas Casady, rector of All Saints church, will speak at this luncheon at which Bishop Shayler will be the guest of honor.

A dinner in honor of the bishop will be given at 6:30 p. m., in the University club by the Episcopal men of the city. Three hundred are expected to attend. C. S. Montgomery, chancellor of the diocese, will represent the laymen on this occasion.

Following his graduation from the divinity school at Kenyon college, Gambier, O., twenty-five years ago, Bishop Shayler was ordained a priest by Bishop Boyd Vincent, D. D., bishop of the south Ohio diocese. He received his degree of doctor of divinity from this school. His first parish was Calvary church, Sandusky, O. During his electorate there, a new church was built and dedicated. In 1889 he was elected rector of Grace church, Oak Park, Chicago, to succeed Bishop Anderson who had been elected bishop of the diocese of Chicago. During his nine year pastorate in Chicago the membership of Grace church was increased from 400 to 1,100, and a large stone church was built at a cost of \$125,000.

He was elected rector of St. Mark church, Seattle, Wash., in 1905, where he remained for ten years. While there he planned and developed the scheme for the Seattle Victory Memorial to cost \$500,000. After \$134,000 had been raised toward the building of the project, he was elected bishop of the Nebraska diocese in 1919.

In accepting his Nebraska charge, Bishop Shayler announced that he would be bishop of all the people of Nebraska whom he might be able to serve. One of the first instances of this public service was a watch night service arranged by him on the stage of the Gayety theatre New Year's eve, 1919. During the disturbance incident to the court house riot in 1919, he issued a pastoral letter to the Nebraska press urging the necessity of obedience to the law.

During his diocesan visits, he has made it a practice to speak before audiences of high school students all over the state as well as university and college students.

During the three years of his administration of this diocese, the Episcopal churches of the state have made a healthy growth, 1,000 children being added to the Sunday schools. The largest confirmation classes on record in the diocese have been confirmed during the past three years.

At Lincoln during Bishop Shayler's administration, the only Episcopal church built for, and managed by university students has been established. The bishop expects to authorize the purchase soon of a convalescent home across from the university campus for the use of Episcopal students in the university.

In addition to his church duties Bishop Shayler is president of the board of trustees of Clarkson Memorial hospital and hospital department in its management, particularly in its free service to the needy sick. He is also president of the board of trustees of Brownell hall, which was occupying quarters in a group of buildings on Twenty-eighth avenue until the recent purchase of the eleven-acre grounds of the Happy Hollow club. A \$300,000 church plant will be erected on the new grounds in time, it is hoped, for the opening of the next fall term.

U. S. MARSHAL RETURNS TO HIS HOME IN OMAHA TODAY

C. J. O'Connor, Who has Been Here Since August, Ordered Back Home as Conditions Quiet

From Saturday's Daily. This morning C. J. O'Connor departed for his home in Omaha, being relieved of his work here as one of the deputy U. S. marshals for service in Nebraska during the strike of the shopcrafts and the marshal will now take up his other routine work in the department of justice.

The conditions here have been the best of any place in Nebraska as far as can be learned as to outbreaks during the strike and the marshal has had but little to do during his assignment here of a serious nature, but nevertheless has been alert and on the job all of the time.

At the time Mr. O'Connor arrived here the situation was aggravated by the presence of armed guards at the Burlington station and at the shops but shortly after his arrival the presence of the guards at the passenger station was done away with and since that time there has been little to cause any agitation aside from a number of outbreaks among different neighborhoods that were undoubtedly neighborhood disturbances rather than a concerted disturbance.

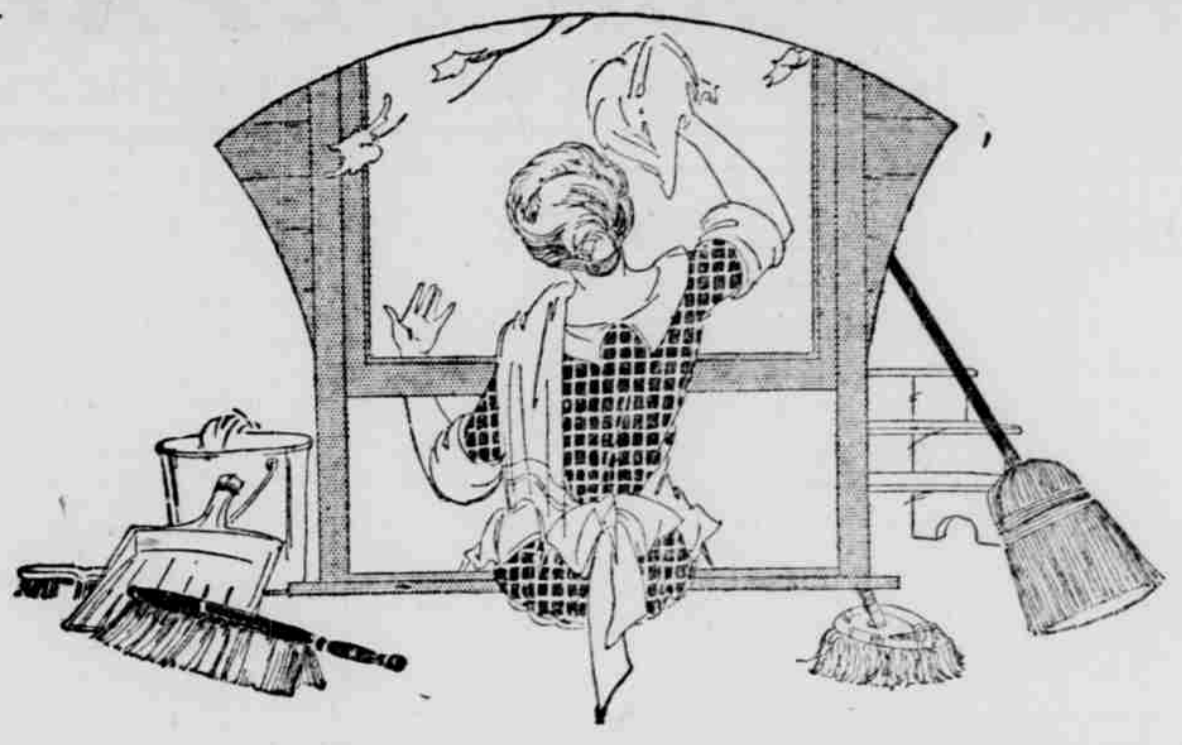

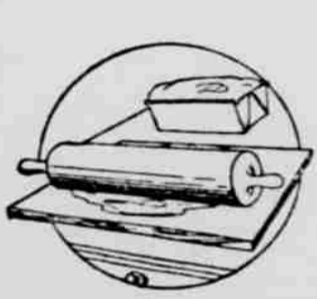

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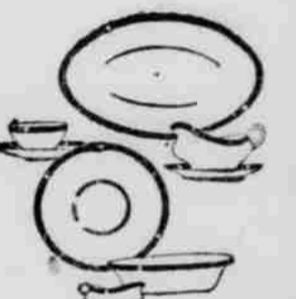
