Negotiations Under Way are Expected to Mark Establishment of Great Industry There.

Washington, Feb. 6 .- Negotiations

are under way which are expected to initiate the establishment of an important industry in Southern Alaska capable of furnishing perpetually a large proportion of print paper de-mands of the United States. Secre-tary Wallace, of the department of agriculture, expects soon to sign contracts with a number of responsible concerns for the purchase of pulp-wood from Alaska national forests and for the allocation of waterpower sites through the federal power commission for the purpose of manufacturing both pulpwood and paper. On the Tongass nation forest it is estimated there is a source of supply of timber which can furnish perpetually an annual yield of print paper equal to one-third of the total national consumption of the United States. The industry when establish-

pletion. The merchantable timber on that forest includes at least 100,-000.000 cords of western hemlock and Sitka spruce.
As a step forward the establish-

ment of the paper industry in Alaska, the Tongass forest has been tentatively divided into fourteen zones, each embracing sufficient timber to furnish a large paper mill with a permanent supply of raw material.

Each zone has been delineated so as to include water power sites suffi-

The federal power commission has been co-operating with the forest service in securing the water power
