PRIVATE OWNED PLANTS ARE OPERATED FOR LESS

A survey by the Indiana Utility Commission shows that the privately owned plants in that state are run more economically than the municipally owned plants. Out of each \$100 of revenue the privately owned plants paid out last year an average of \$63.93 for operating expenses against \$73.44 by the municipal planyts. The private plants paid \$7.68 for taxes while the public took up the slack for the failure of the municipal plants to pay any taxes.
