### AN OLD TIME RELIC

From Friday's Daily.

During the process of tearing down the residence owned by William Barclay on Pearl street between Fourth and Fifth streets, a real old time relic was discovered by M. S. Briggs, who in 1909 erected the house that Mr. Barclay is now tearing down.

At the time Mr. Briggs changed over the house he used a number of the shingles that were on the roof of the original house erected here in the late sixties by Miles Morgan, and on visiting the scene of the dismantling of the house yesterday Mr. Briggs recovered a few of these shingles that were in a good state of preservation.

The shingles were the output of a pioneer shingle mill located in what was then East Plattsmouth and were made in 1868 and brought to this city by Mr. Morgan. The mill that made the shingles was erected in 1860 and they were manufactured by being cut from a large block instead of being sawed as was used later in the process of milling.
