





Heim of Louisville. There are thirty-three grand children and thirty great grandchildren.

Mr. Heim was ninety-two years of age and one of the best beloved residents of Cass county and has since his accident on December 6, 1922. when he fell and broke uis leg, been rapidly declining and has for the past nine months been bedfast.
