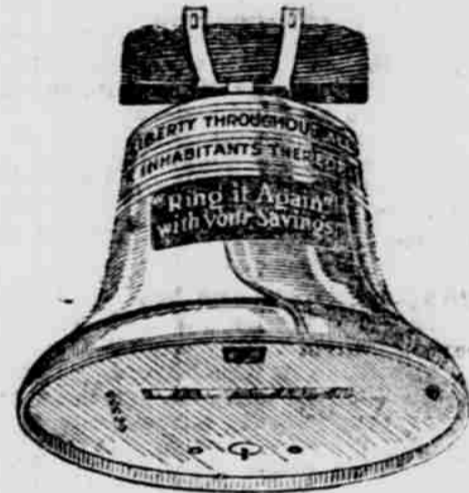

Whereas, we the Cass County Women's Christian Temperance Union, find many things for which we can be thankful for we see before us great opportunity for service during the coming year, therefore be it—

Resolved:

1st—That we pledge ourselves to support the 18th amendment with more earnest zeal and to do all we can to encourage any officer who is making an honest effort to perform their duty and aid them in any way possible.

2nd—That we believe in order to accomplish the greatest good, we pledge ourselves, regardless of party, to support only those candidates who will declare their intention to oppose any change in the alcoholic law, or law enforcement that will tend to make them ineffective.

3rd—That we deplore the increase of the use of tobacco and the non-enforcement of the Anti-Cigarette law and we pledge our organization to a more systematic educational program.

4th—That we lay greater stress in placing the Bible in the public schools and urge the reading of the same.

5th—We recommend the organization of the Nebraska Guards and to place scientific temperance instruction in the school room.
