CONTINENTAL INTERESTS TAKE OVER NEW PLANT Big Utility Company of Which Local Light Company is a Branch, Enlarges its Field.

Humphrey, Neb., Oct. 25.—Purchase of the Humphrey Electric Light & Power company by the Continental Gas & Electric corporation of Omaha was announced here today.

The Continental will take possession shortly of the Humphrey company's property, which includes the distribution system, oil generator and steam generator.

The Continental will rebuild the distribution system, which is now 220 volt direct current, for standard 110 volt alternating current and will install a sub-station. Humphrey will then receive its current from the Norfolk-Pullerton high tension line of the Nebraska Gas & Electric company, which is a part of the Continental system.

The company has obtained a twenty-five year franchise and will later obtain contracts for the city's street lighting and water pumping.

The Continental's system now embraces nearly 175 towns and cities in Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri and Canada.
