FRICKE ARRESTED AT NELSON

Former Building & Loan Secretary One of Those Indicted, Will be Brought Here Soon

Yesterday afternoon Sheriff C. D. Quinton left the city with his destination carefully concealed but despite the veil of secrecy thrown over the carrying out of the indictment of the grand jury it was learned that his destination was Nelson, Nebraska, and the purpose was that of serving on Carl G. Fricke, former secretary of the Livingston Loan & Building association, the warrant made on the indictment of the grand jury.

This leaves but one of the indictments remaining unserved and this is generally understood to be one charging J. W. Chilton with fraud in connection with the purchasing of the C. E. Williams store in this city several months ago. whereabouts of Mr. Chilton is unknown at the present time altho it has been understood that he is at his former home at North Platte.

The indictment, growing out of the difficulties that have beset the affairs of the Livingston & Building association, has been expected since the summoning of the grand jury and the former stockholders have been very urgent that someone be held for the responsibility of the trouble that resulted in their loss. It will be remembered that there was at from \$80,000 to \$96,000 in the funds of the association and at the time that the affairs of the company first came into the limelight, J. E. Hart, of the state bureau of banking and commerce, was here to try and adjust the affairs and the stockholders at a meeting decided to carry on the association at that time and a meeting of the officers of the association accepted a settlement from Mr. Fricke of his property and in turn there was executed a signed settlement with the former secretary in which he was cleared of responsibility in the matter. Later the assets of the Livingston Loan & Building association and their remaining stockholders were transferred over to the Standard Co., of Omaha, which has since been carrying on the affairs of the association here
