SECURES CONTRACTS FOR CASS CO. WORK

Monarch Engineering Co. of Falls City, to do Culvert, Guard Work and Bridge Work.

From Wednesday's Daily— At the letting of the contracts under the Nebraska road building program for 1924 at Lincoln yesterday, the Monarch Engineering Co. of Falls City was successful in landing the greater part of the work in Project 153-C which covers the work on the state highway from Eagle to Murdock.

The contract for grading on this project was let to J. W. McGreer of Lincoln for \$11,063.

The Monarch Engineering Co. was awarded the contracts on several classes of work in this county on the same project, culverts, \$3,293; guard rails, \$1,238; bridges, \$8,434.

In the last few years the Monarch Engineering Co. has had the contracts for the county bridge work in Cass county and has apparently given the greatest of satisfaction to the commissioners.

The contract, let yesterday, was made under the "anti-teakettleing" law which was made to stop the practice which was alleged to have existed in many counties of having the bids "tea-kettle" and opened prior to being submitted and by which the favored bidder was given the work on the bids of their competitors. As the result of the new law there were a very large number of bids received by the state engineer.

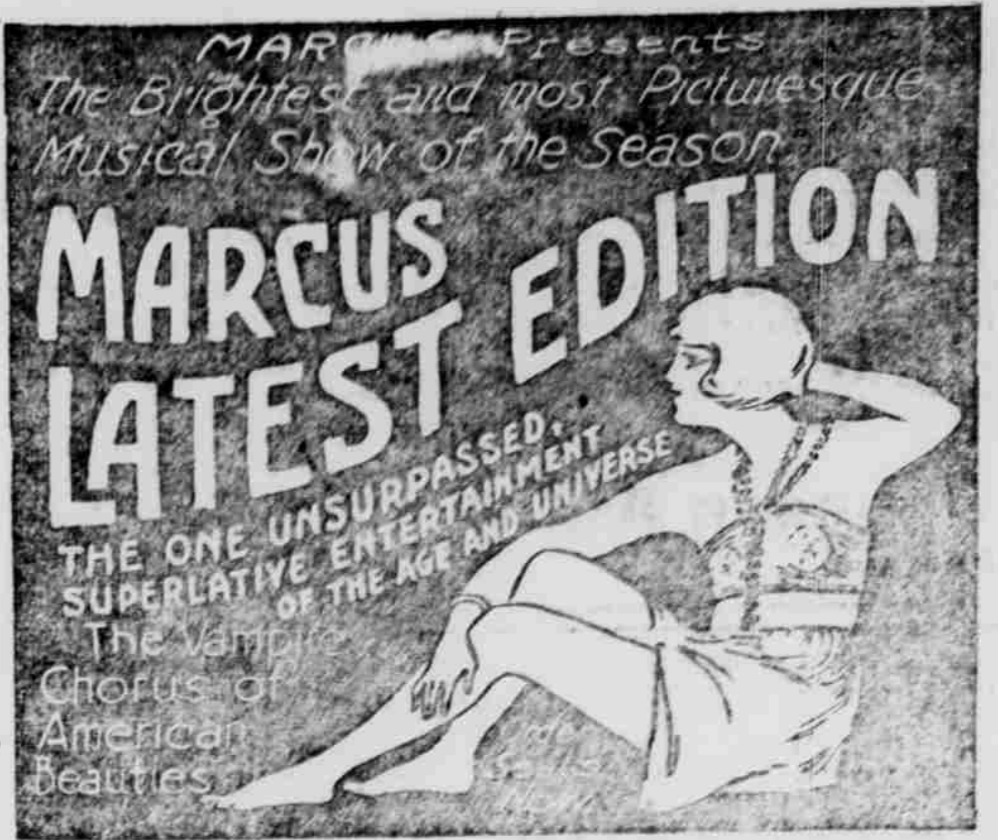

FIVE TONS OF EXPLOSIVE TO SAVE RAILROAD BRIDGE

U. P. Structure South of Valley Menaced by Ice Jams in Platte—Dynamite Rushed In.

From Wednesday's Daily— Dynamiting of ice gorges in the Platte river three miles west of Schuyler, Neb., and in the Platte river south of Valley, is continuing, although it was reported yesterday that the situation is under control.

The Burlington railroad yesterday shipped two thousand pounds of dynamite from South Bend to Schuyler. Almost continuous blasting for several days has been necessary to keep the channel open and insure the safety of the Burlington bridge there.

The Union Pacific bridge just south of Valley has been menaced for two weeks. It was reported. Ten thousand pounds of dynamite already have been used by the railroad to break up the ice jams.

A United States army bombing plane from Langley field, Va., was stopped at Rantoul, Ill., en route to Omaha. It is held there in readiness and will be summoned by radio by Major Churchill, in charge of air service here, if conditions warrant, he announced. Major Churchill said he was being kept posted by the railroad companies.
