Accuse Coolidge Forces in North Dakota of Secretly Aiding "Sticker" Campaign for Senator

Chicago, March 21.—A declaration that the Coolidge campaign management had given great impetus to a third party ticket headed by Senator Robert M. LaFollette, and a charge that the Coolidge forces were secretly active in the "sticker" campaign for Senator LaFollette were combined in a statement issued today by Harold L. Ickes, Illinois campaign manager for Senator Hiram Johnson. Mr. Ickes charged that the Coolidge forces spent \$25,000 in furthering the use of stickers bearing the name of Senator LaFollette.

Fargo, N. D., March 21.—Returns from 1,934 precincts out of 2,058 in North Dakota for republican presidential choice give: Coolidge, 50,529; LaFollette, 37,052; Johnson, 20,934.

Atlanta, March 21.—Belated returns today in the Georgia democratic presidential preference primary brought William G. McAdoo's probable total vote strength in the state convention April 23, to 320 delegates. Senator Oscar W. Underwood of Alabama, Mr. McAdoo's only opponent in the race, will have eighty-four delegates, returns indicated.

CAMPAIGN BEGUN FOR ENTRY INTO THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

New York, March 21.—A campaign for the entry of the United States into the league of nations and the world court was started last night by the league of nations non-partisan association at a dinner attended by 1,000 persons, including fifty-four foreign guests. Among speakers who urged American participation in the league were Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor.
