COLORED WARRIORS ARE DEFEATED VERY BADLY YESTERDAY

Brands Giants Fail to Show Form Against Local Ball Team and Lose 14 to 4 Yesterday.

Yesterday afternoon a fair sized crowd of the baseball fans gathered at the local lot to witness the meeting of the Plattsmouth team with that of the Brands Giants, reputed one of the fastest colored organizations in these parts but the dusky-hued exponents of the art of baseball failed to live up to their reputation and were defeated by a large score, 14 to 4 being the final result when the wearied Plattsmouth players had toiled around the bases and registered at the plate.

The game was very interesting up to the fifth inning when it became a tragedy for the visitors and continued to grow more cheerless as the locals added to their scoring.

In the opening stanza, "Bones," the hurler of the visitors, was having a great deal of trouble in controlling his ball although he had lots of steam and when working right would evidently have made another story of the conflict. Mason was on in the opener with a single and followed by Herb Klauschie who drew passes from the clony lured slab artist and were just resting on the bases to get their wind when Honos Newman unlimbered a hard one on the visitors that landed in deep center garden and on which he secured a home run as the fielders were unable to locate the ball.

The visitors added two more in the fourth inning and made it look like it was going to be a real game but the pitcher was fast weakening and the outfield of the visitors may have been a whirlwind in playing African golf but were far too slow to do business with the hard hits that were drove into their localities and many errors were chalked up on the fielders and which added to the Plattsmouth score.

The fifth gave the visitors another run and made the score stand 4 to 5 but it was not standing very long as the Plattsmouth half of the inning there was big doing with the stick and three more runs sent over the plate and this was followed by the hectic sixth that added two more runs and took the joy out of life for the visitors who played the rest of the game in a listless manner. Art Klauschie did the teasing for Plattsmouth and was effective at the critical stages of the game and received gilt edged support, very few errors being chalked up against the locals and many of these were on balls that were really too hard to handle, but on which the infielders took a chance.
