DRILLING AT NE-HAWKA REVEALS SECRETS OF PAST

Interesting Story of Land Formation in Nebraska Brought to Light as Result of Oil Well

Lincoln, June 8.—Farmers scratch the top of the plains and rolling ground of Nebraska with their plows, but know little of the earth and rock that is far below the plow's share. Geological experts at the University of Nebraska here are attempting to find what forms of earth Nebraska rests on.

Like the small boys who would find a short cut to China by digging through the earth, the geologists are boring deep holes into the soil, and preserving the borings.

Some of them indicate that Nebraska, real deep down, is about 20 million years old, although on the surface she seems but a "sub-deb."

Paleontological remains imbedded in the shales and rocks of the test boring show that time after time Nebraska has been invaded by the sea.

So three months hence Nebraskans may know part of the history of their state before the rail lines were stretched across it, before the first settlers trekked into it, before the red men inhabited it and even before the buffalo roamed the hills and plains.

Last rites for Dr. C. LeRoy Meisinger, who met a tragic death last Tuesday when lightning struck the balloon in which he was making a series of air tests for the weather bureau over Bement, Ill., were held Sunday afternoon.

Rev. Jack Leonard delivered the funeral sermon at the church. "We remember many lines of a man of great faithfulness, a man of duty, a man of faithfulness and a man of love. If you have those four words, friendship, duty, faithfulness, and love you have a picture of Dr. Meisinger," said the speaker.

SWIMMING POOL TO BE GIVEN ATTENTION AT ONCE

Plans Are Now Perfected and the Committee in Readiness to Push Subscriptions to Project.

The general committee composed of the various organizations that are interested in the project of a swimming pool for this city this season, met this morning to discuss fully the completed plans and to arrange to give the residents of the city the full opportunity of getting in on the boosting of this feature of summer entertainment.

In order that a great many who desire to take stock may do so, the value of the stock has been placed at \$25 per share. This stock is to be issued in the construction and management of the pool and the receipts are first to be used in paying off the stock holders as the funds accumulate and the pool when paid for is to be made a community enterprise.

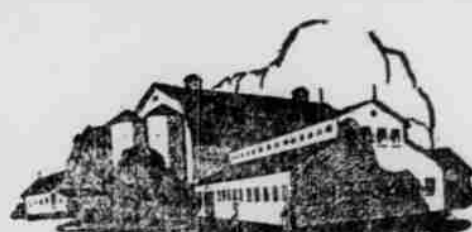
The plans for the big pool which have been prepared by the state university engineers calls for a pool 230x65 feet in size, three-quarters of which is to be of a shallow depth running from the lowest to a depth of five feet nine inches and at one end of the pool will be a depth of ten to twelve feet and where the spring boards will be placed for the use of the more experienced swimmers.

Around the pool there will be a four foot concrete walk and a guard where the water splashed from the pool can be drained off. There will be every effort to keep the water in the best of shape and the pool will be cleaned and freshened several times a week and the water purified before being used so that it will be the best and most healthful that is possible to find.

The committee will put the swimming pool proposition directly up to the residents of this community for their action and from their decision will depend whether or not there is a pool here but the committee can feel that they have done their best in the work they have so far carried out in the preliminary plans for the pool.
