THE FUNCTION OF BUSINESS ORGA-**NIZATION IS GIVEN**

C. W. Watson, Secretary of the Federation of Nebraska Retailers Broadcast Over Radio.

The following is a very timely address by C. W. Watson, secretary of the Federation of Nebraska Retailers, of Lincoln, which was given to the residents of the middle west Monday evening over the radio station KFKX, Hastings:

The function of business is threefold:-First, to provide for the material needs of mankind; second, to increase the wealth of the world; and third, to enhance the value and happiness of life. These functions are but the natural results of human existence and social intercourse. The material needs of foods, clothing and shelter are essential to human existence.

To produce an adequate supply of these material needs for current consumption is not sufficient. There must needs be produced a surplus, whether in commodities or money that shall be available to provide the the means of communication and tools and machinery of production, transportation, and further to provide a certain amount of leisure for recreation and play and for mental and moral developement.

Business must never forget that it has a higher function to perform than that of providing material needs and creating a surplus. It is the inherent right of men to be happy. No business concern, whether it be individual or corporate, has a right to exist solely for its own sake.
