The present quarter's lessons bagan with the birth of Jesus the Christ and included his boyhood, his temptation, his baptism, the selecting of his disciples, his first miracle, his cleansing of the Temple, the healing of the Centurion's son, the marriage feast at Cana, the discourse leper.
