Stored Grain Pests

Now is the time to be on the lookout for pests in your stored grain. The most satisfactory method of destroying the weevil is by fumigating with carbon bisulfide. This is used at the rate of one pound to 35 bushels of grain. This should be evaporated from shallow cans or sprinkled over the grain. Particular caution should be taken as carbon bisulfide is highly inflammable; one should be very careful about igniting the vapor.

Wintery Poultry Quarters

With time for getting the pullets out winter quarters poultry raisers are again confronted with the problem of poultry housing. Whatever type of the poultry house may be order to be satisfactory it must be.

1—Roomy, 3 to 4 square feet of floor space per bird depending somewhat upon the breed and the size of your flock.

2—Well ventilated—provision must be made for interchange of air without drafts.

3—Convenient for both the birds and attendant. This applies largely to the arrangement of equipment.

4—Economical construction. Whether the house be built of frame or hollow tile the construction depends somewhat upon their availability.
