

WHAT IS SAUERKRAUT?

Washington, D. C., Aug. 28 .- An fficial definition of sauerkraut was approved today by Secretary Jardine as a guide for department officials in enforcement of food and drugs act. The secretary ruled that sauerkraut is "the clean, sound product of characteristic acid flavor, ob tained by the full fermentation. chiefly lactic, of properly prepared and shredded cabbage and the presence of not less than 2 per cent no more than 3 per cent of salt.

"It contains upon completion of the fermentation not less than 1 1/2 per cent of acid, expressed as lactic acid," said the definition.


