Dr. Lehnhoff Gains Recognition in Press

Well Known Lincoln Practitioner is Author of Numerous Articles—Devoted to Study.

While visiting in Lincoln last week, a member of the Courier family had the pleasure of a short visit at the home of Dr. and Mrs. H. J. Lehnhoff and the many Cass county friends of the doctor will be pleased to learn that he is now well on the road to recovery from his recent extended illness. He is up and around the house and is looking forward soon to be able to be out and attending to his business again.

During the convalescence, Dr. Lehnhoff has spent many profitable hours in reading and study and has devoted considerable time to writing and making notes for future use in his lectures. A very interesting article appeared in a recent issue of the Lincoln State Journal under the heading, "Medicine and the Social Parasite," which indicates clearly his comprehensive view of the doctor's place in society and his duty to his fellow men as well as the duty of the public to the physician. In his article, Dr. Lehnhoff makes a plea for a greater effort to lessen the number of dependents upon society, thereby making them stronger, instead of weakening them. His articles show deep study of all social conditions and with the same skill that makes him one of the foremost diagnosticians of the state, he lays his finger on the weakness of the social systems and prescribes the remedy. Dr. Lehnhoff was born on the old farm home at College Hill in the year 1871. After fitting himself for his chosen profession, he located in Lincoln about 25 years ago and he has enjoyed a very successful and lucrative practice. In recognition of his standing he was elected president of the Nebraska State Medical Association for the year 1925. Previous to this time, in 1923, he was president of the Missouri Valley Medical society. His long illness occasioned his family and friends considerable uneasiness and his many friends will rejoice to know that his complete recovery is now only a matter of a short time.—Louisville Courier.

Peru Wins Another Game in the Conference

By Score of 27 to 13, Bob Cats Depose Cotner from the State College Lead.

The basketball game on Saturday evening at Peru, between the Bob Cats of that place and the hitherto undefeated team of Cotner university, attracted a state-wide attention, as it was one of the deciding games in the state conference, and a large number from here drove to the Nebraska college town to witness the battle. The occasion was also Plattsmouth night at the Peru game, this being set aside in honor of the Plattsmouth students who are on the team, Joe Krejci and Russell Wasley. By their clean cut 27 to 13 victory, Peru displaced Cotner, which school has been leading the state conference, for the leadership and also rang up their forty-ninth straight victory in the conference. The game opened with Cotner taking the lead, Captain Borgard, Cotner guard, and Tisley, left forward, each sinking a field goal, before the

Bob Cats were warm for action, while on a free throw by Joe Krejci, Peru gained one point. Two field goals by Krejci, former Plattsmouth high school center and who is now center for the normal school, gained the lead for Peru and which they held until the close of the game. "Bitzi," captain of the Peru team, was high point man with 13 markers, beating Krejci by two points as Joe annexed 11 points for his team. On the floor work Krejci stirred the crowd with his speed and added greatly in the winning of the contest. Russell Wasley, left guard of Peru, played a fast and speedy game and while not in the scoring, was a great factor in preventing the visitors from adding to their list of scores. After his retirement in the last quarter, Cotner was able to add three field goals to their score. Wasley was injured in the early part of the second half of the game, receiving a very severe blow in the left eye and was knocked to the floor, dazing him for several minutes and the eye was affected to such an extent that it was necessary to remove him later from the game as the injured optic interfered with his playing to a marked extent. He pluckily remained in the contest, however, until his team was practically assured of victory. The injury is not dangerous and it is thought that the eye will be in good shape for the next game at the end of the week when the Bob Cats go to Fremont to play Midland.
