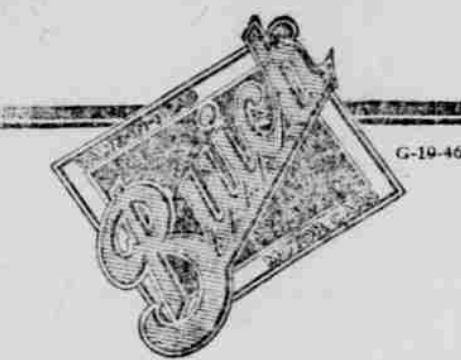

Pendleton, Ore., June 3.—Water in the Hermiston irrigation project, ordered shut off a week ago, was turned on again Wednesday after adjustments had been reached with interior department officials. Trouble started in the Hermiston area when the government demanded that settlers pay up delinquent charges from 1923, aggregating \$59,900. Settlers believed that all back charges were to be refunded under terms of recent legislation.
