MERELY VULGAR
 When Rudolph Valentino died, his two former wives and the woman who said she was engaged to be married to him, and the man who had been his personal manager, vied with each other in vulgarity of display and of public conduct. The manager conducted the lying-in-state and the funeral itself as if he was intent on giving the most startling theatrical performance he could devise. With the grossest of bad taste, he acted as amajordomo and stage-manager combined, and prolonged his scenes in New York until the police were driven to take a hand and until the press and the public itself, were disgusted with the managers' showmanship.
 Each of the women seemed determined to gain for herself every flash and every word of publicity that she could squeeze out of the dead man's conspicuous position as a motion picture actor and out of her association with him. WOMEN JURORS
 Missouri women want to serve on juries. The League of Women Voters will sponsor a measure to be introduced at the next session of the Legislature to obtain this privilege. The strenuous and sometimes amusing efforts of men to dodge jury service does not seem to deter the other sex from seeing it. "Lawyers cannot hamboozle women jurors as they can men, and jury service for women has proved a benefit to the entire administration of criminal justice," declared Judge E. Allen of the Supreme Court of Ohio, one of 22 states where women serve on juries, in an address last Saturday. If it has proved a benefit in other states women as, why not inaugurate it in Nebraska?
