But on Monday morning about 2 o'clock, he began to sink and continued weaker until he passed away at eleven o'clock, Sept. 5th.

**Obituary.**  
William Henry Murdoch was born in Cass county, Nebraska on June 2nd, 1863 and departed this life at the Cambridge hospital, Cambridge Nebraska, on September 5th, 1927, aged 62 years, 3 months and 3 days. He was the son of John and Sarah Murdoch, who came to Nebraska from Ohio in the year 1854, while Nebraska was yet a territory. In this family were eight children of whom Henry was the next to the oldest. His father, mother, one brother and on sister have preceded him to the other world.

Henry Murdoch came from Cass county, Nebraska, to a farm in East Muddy precinct, Gosper county, in the spring of 1888, he returned to Cass county in the fall and was united in marriage to Della O. Colvin on December 23rd, 1889, he, with his wife returned to Gosper county where they resided until three years ago when they moved to Arapahoe.

Mr. Murdoch was one of the early settlers of Gosper county, much interested in developing and subduing the wild prairie, making it a pleasant and home-like place in which to live. He was a good and dependable neighbor, always willing to help in time of need. No night was too dark or too cold for him to go and help some one in need, no worthy one was ever turned from his door hungry.

Due to his strenuous labors and frugal habits he leaves his family in comfortable circumstances. Early in life he was converted and united with the United Brethren church of Otterbein, Nebraska, to which he was a faithful adherent until his demise.

He remains to mourn his departure his loving wife, two sons, Oscar J. and Charles B., both residents of Gosper county, one grandson, Floyd William; also two brothers, John and Albert of Cass county, 3 sisters, Mary Norris and Rena Warden of Cass county, and Ruth Thomas of Lincoln.

His last days were days of hope and trust in his Heavenly Father, and to the writer of these notes, who visited him four days before his death he expressed a strong desire that the means to be used would restore his health; yet he said, "God's will be done, not mine."
